Maryland Chicken. cup water (broilers) Fine bread crumbs 1 cup evaporated 1 tsp. salt Dash pepper milk diluted

2 tbsp. flour Dress, clean and cut up chickens. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dip in crumbs, egg, and crumbs. Place in a well-oiled dripping pan, and bake twenty minutes in a 450-degree F. oven, then reduce the temperataure to 350 degrees F. and cook until tender, about twenty minutes longer. Baste every ten minutes during cooking with 1/3 cup melted butter. Remove to platter and pour around a cream sauce made of fat in dripping pan, the flour,

diluted milk, salt and pepper. Asparagus en Fri. 1 bunch fresh 1/2 cup water asparagus tbsp. butter 6 rounds toast 2 tbsp. flour 6 poached eggs tsp. salt ½ cup evaporated Pepper milk diluted ½ cup ½ cup grated

Prepare a white sauce of the butter flour, salt, pepper and diluted milk. Cook the asparagus in boiling salted water. Drain and add to white sauce. Place a poached egg in center of toast. Pour asparagus around the egg and sprinkle grated cheese over top of all. Serve at once. Serves six.
