THE WILLIAM BAXTER FAMILY OF RUTHERFORD COUNTY

(BY JAMES C. ELLIOTT)

Lattimore, Dec. 2.—(To the Editor of The Forest City Courier.) I am indebted to Mr. D. B. F. Suttles, of Shelby, for this sketch of that notable family. Mr. Suttles is one of the younger grandsons of Billy Baxter. He is 84 years old and one of my last surviving comrades of Co. "F," 56th North Carolina Regiment, C. S. A., so I got the following history from him:

William Baxter came here alone from Scotland and stopped first in Mecklenburg County, where he married a Miss Berryhill, and they settled near Forest City. They reared five sons and six daughters, viz: Joseph, Andy, William, David and Thomas; Mrs. Jane Spencer Eaves, Mrs. Caroline Hill, Mrs. Betsy Amos Harrill, Mrs. Sallie Ben Suttles, Mrs. Polly Todd, Mrs. Susan Camp. His second wife was Miss Lee, of Rutherford County. They reared four sons and one daughter: John, George, Eliza and Taylor Baxter, and one daughter, Mrs. Easter Durham, making a total of nine sons and seven daughters.

William Baxter was a man of short stature—industrious and frugal, he accumulated much wealth for his time, and he lived to be 96 years old. He and his older sons traded in negroes. His son, William, was murdered and robbed of his money in the State of Tennessee. The white murderers fled the country and a negro implicated was hanged. Two small children were also killed with Baxter. The Baxters were Whigs, and the younger boys took an interest in politics. John and George were popular and brilliant

lawyers. George died young and John married his widow.

State Solicitor Mark Irvin fought a duel with John Baxter and crippled Baxter's arm.

John Baxter moved to Tennessee, where he opposed secession and joined with Andy Johnson and William G. Brownlow. They held East Tennessee for the Union, and raised thirty-two regiments for her. U. S. Judge Elija Baxter settled in Arkansas and was governor of that State during reconstruction times. These were the most prominent sons.

Then came the grand sons, Capt. John B. Eaves, Capt. Lasson Harrill, M. D., Capt. Plato Durham, Rev. Columbus Durham, Rev. Joseph Suttles, Sheriff Dobbins Suttles, Dr. John B. Harrill.

Great-grandsons, Rev. Plato Durham, noted Methodist preacher, of Atlanta, Ga.; Robert Durham, of Gastonia; Hon. Romulus Z. Linney; Sheriff Ab Suttles, Rev. John W. Suttles, and Dr. Lasson Harrill, of Caroleen; present State Auditor, Baxter Durham; Rev. Pleas Bostic, missionary in China for thirty years, lately deceased. Great-great-grandson, Frank Linney, U. S. District Attorney. Copel Linney married a daughter of Joseph Baxter.

The Baxters were leaders of the Whig party. Dr. Columbus Mills and Dr. Ladson Mills were Democrats. Rutherford County was Whig and Cleveland was Democratic. Thomas L. Clingman and Zebulon B. Vance were Whigs. Secession broke up the Whig party. Times and conditions change. Every generation sets its pace. My folks were mostly Whigs, and admirers of the Baxters.

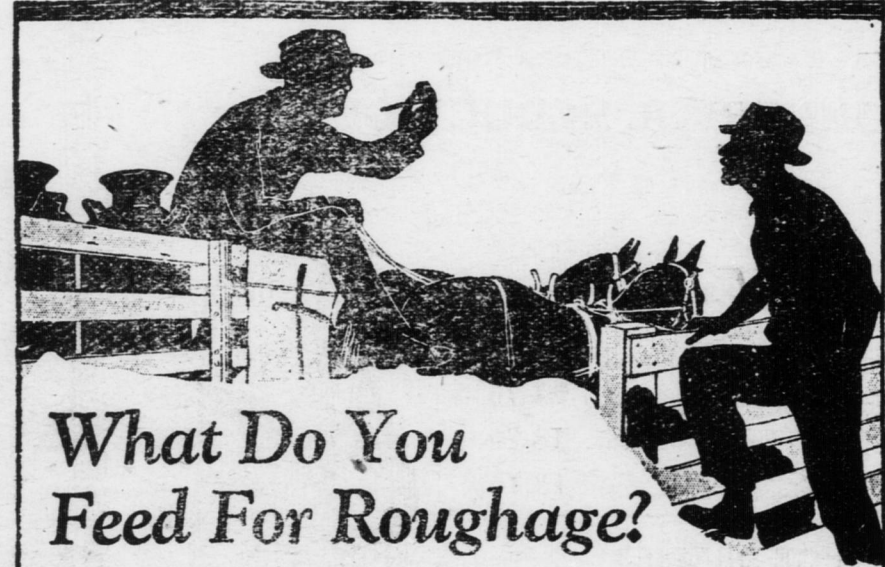
