

J. E. M'FARLAND **DIES SUDDENLY** AT HOME HERE

Former Legislator and Prominent Rutherford County Man Drops Dead.

Death came to the Hon. J. E. Mc-Farland with shocking suddenness at his home here at 12:30 Friday, February 25. After finishing his noon meal, he was sitting reading his newspaper, when, without outcry or warning, he suddenly fell from his chair to the floor, and expired before assistance could reach him.

His sister, Miss Kate McFarland, seeing him fall, rushed to his side and saw at a glance that he was in desperate straits. Unable to lift him from the floor, and realizing that he was in a dying condition, she immediately' summoned neighbors to her assistance, who, responding hastily, found him dead upon their arrival.

Mr. McFarland's death was the result of heart failure. He had a desperate attack of illness in November, when his life was despaired of, a stroke of paralysis almost proving fatal at that time. 
