Johnson, 30 years old, of Spindale, is a fugitive from justice and is being hunted by posses throughout the county, on a warrant sworn out Saturday by a pretty 18 year old Ruthwas criminally attacked by Johnson up in North Carolna. Saturday afternoon.

Johnson was arrested by Policemen Duncan and Green, of Spindale, and Houser, of Rutherfordton, about eight o'clock Saturday night as he was emerging from the theatre in Rutherfordton. 
