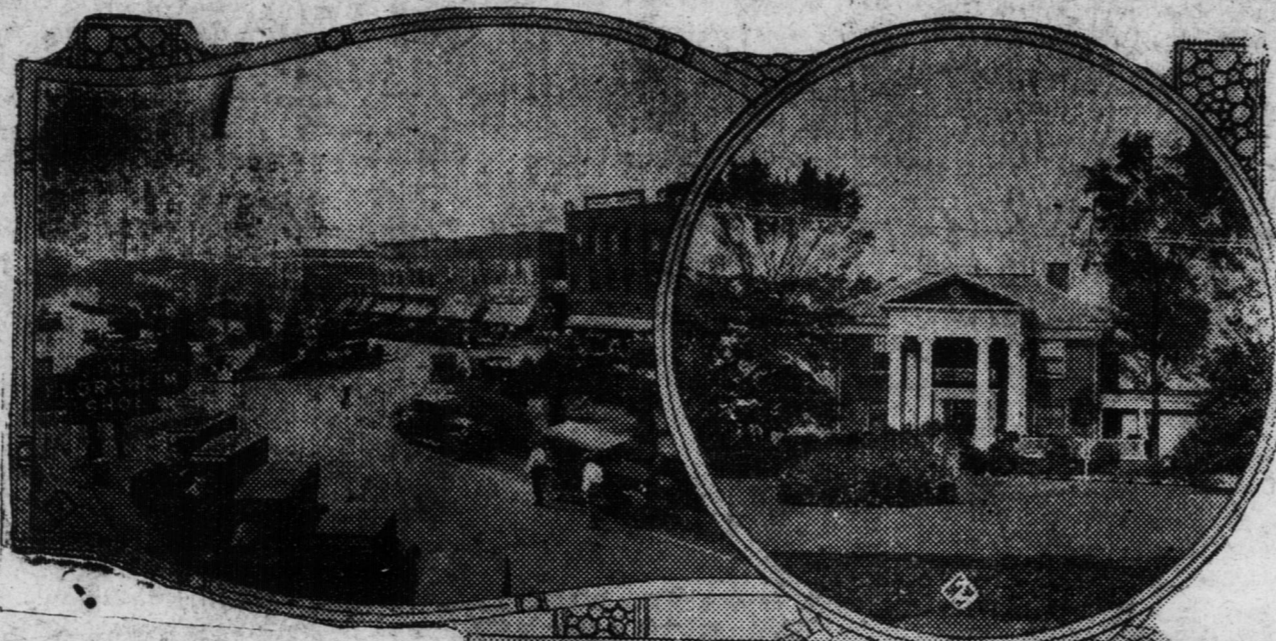

FAIR ASSOCIATION TO ISSUE PASS BUTTONS

Rumors to the effect that a ticket must be purchased each time a concessionaire enters the Fair ground have been denied by the Fair officials. A button will be issued to exhibitors, concessionaires, officials, etc., and as long as this button is worn they may go and come at will without the expense of buying a ticket each time they enter.

At a meeting of the Fair officials Tuesday arrangements for satisfactorily handling the huge crowds expected were made. Parking will be allowed anywhere on the Association's property as long as it does not interfere with traffic.

Steps have also been taken to eliminate the mistakes of the past fairs, and to put into practice the wisdom learned by experience. A new system will be worked on the ticket sales and ticket collecting this year, says officials.
