

From December 1, 1926, to December 1, 1927, 12 poultry cars were operated from the county and a total of 84,-922 pounds of poultry was sold. Lincoln county was second with 79,-375 pounds, Sampson third with 68,-338. Burke fourth in selling 68,-266 and Macon fifth with 52,358 pounds.
