MUST IMPROVE COTTON TO FIT MILL NEEDS

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 23.—While the cotton growers of southeastern United States produce annually, five million bales, the amount generally consumed by the textile mills of this section, the mills have to go to other sections for about half of the cotton they use.

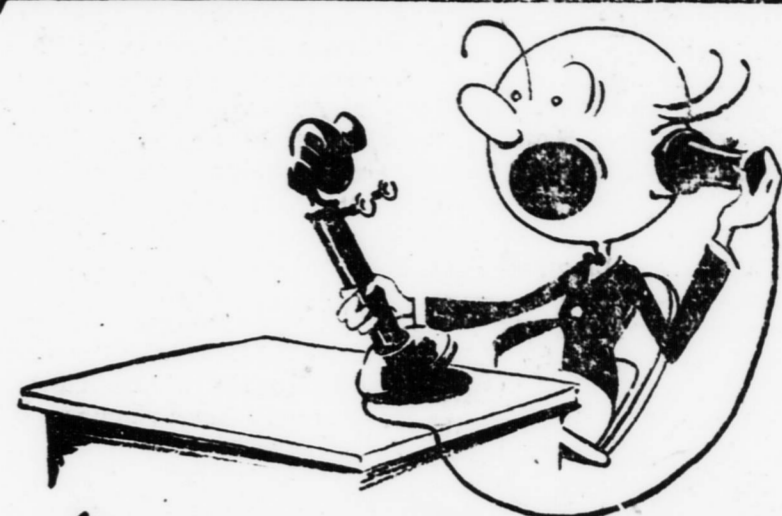
"We have found through a careful survey that the growers of cotton in the southeastern section of our country are producing about the same number of bales of cotton that the mills of this section consume," says Dr. R. Y. Winters, director of the North Carolina Experiment Station. "Yet we have found also that these mills must go to some other sections for about half of the cotton that they use. This means that more than half of our cotton is exported and more than half of the mill needs is brought in from other growers. This is due to one thing. Our cottons are too short in length of staple. More than 85 per cent of our production is less than an inch in length."

While these facts do not apply strictly to North Carolina yet the same thing is generally true in this State. The mills of the southeast must have about 30 per cent of their consumption in cottons of one inch or longer. The type that is being produced at present will supply less than half of this demand. Farmers of North Carolina are making excellent progress in adopting cottons like the improved Cleveland Big Boll and the Mexican Big Boll. The latter variety is especially adapted

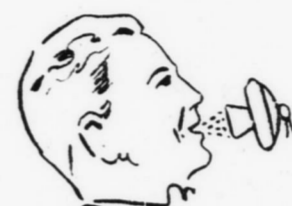
to producing staple of medium length which is so much in demand by the mills. In Union County, the farmers are getting a premium for their crop because of the general adoption of the Mexican variety.

Dr. Winters believes that growers of this state can be very successful

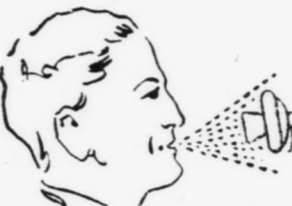
in producing cottons which give an inch or an inch and one-eighth staple. Many demonstrations have proved this. He states that with proper attention to pure seed, cooperative production and soil improvement, the growers here can produce as good staple as is grown anywhere.



do you talk in your telephone - or at it?



This is the right way to hold the telephone—directly in front of and one inch away from the lips. The mouthpiece catches the sound waves (represented by the dotted lines) so that your voice is heard clearly.



And this is the wrong way to hold the telephone. The full force of the sound waves escapes the mouthpiece and the voice is heard indistinctly.

THE rubber mouthpiece on the telephone transmitter was put there for a specific purpose. It concentrates the sound waves when you speak in your telephone. Now if you merely talk at your telephone, holding the transmitter to one side or several inches away from your lips, the mouthpiece cannot help you. Furthermore, the person at the other end of the line will find it difficult to understand you.

If the person you are talking with complains that he cannot hear you—try holding the transmitter as directed.
