This morning affords me the pleasure of once more writing you a few lines, and informing you that I am still alive, though mightily worn by fighting. Fighting is going on regularly here. We are in our ditches and have to lay low and keep out road, thence with the road N 11 of the way of bullets that fly fast and thick at times. We had to fall! back last night and build more breastworks. I am so sleepy that I can corner to lots No. 9 and 10, thence scarcely see. You must excuse this hurriedly written letter, and when we finish here I will try to do better by the next one I write, if I; live. I am almost out of heart. 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
