The building has at present forty stalls for displaying produce, but when the summer season opens another row of twenty stalls will be placed in the center of the floor.

The market is in charge of Mrs. M. M. Young, as manager. The market opens at 8 o'clock on Tuesdays and Saturdays and closes at 11:30 on Tuesdays and 2 p. m. on Saturdays.

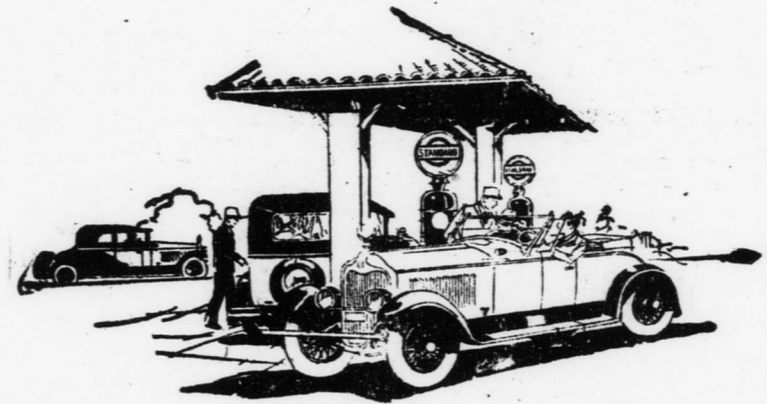

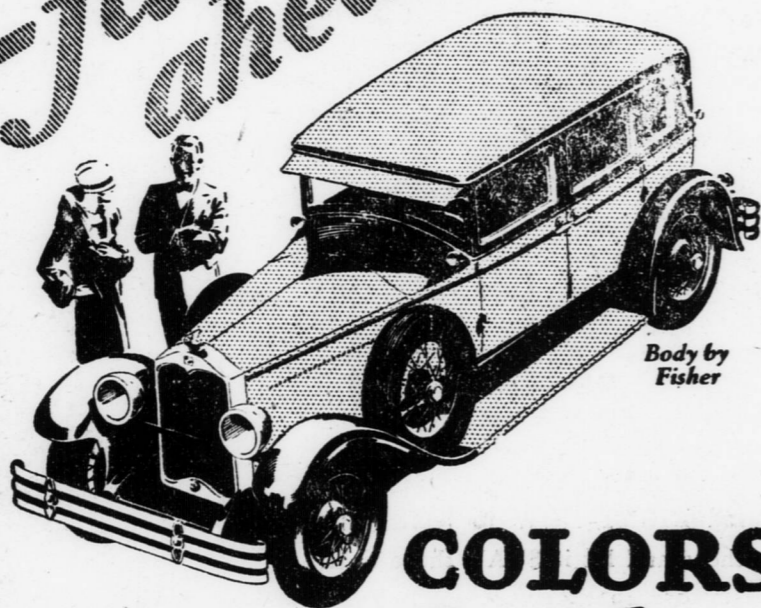
