Although the county experienced a severe cold spell during the past three days, none of the fruit has been injured to any extent, says county agent F. E. Patton. Mr. Patton attributes the survival of the fruit crop to the fact that there was a light crop last year. He says that trees are more hardy following a light crop year than if they bore heavily the year before. Fruit in the mountain counties north and west of Rutherford county was badly damaged, especially peaches and pears. Mr. Patton says indications are that Rutherford county will have a record crop of all fruit this year.
