CAN SELL POTATOES WHEN QUALITY IS GOOD

Raleigh, N. C., April 23.—Sweet potatoes of good quality usually find a ready sale and it is just as costly as it is to grow something that the market desires.

"If more of our growers of sweet potatoes would avoid planting the Spindale, April 24.-A most en- crop in the loamy heavy soils and sease.
