## NEW BANK OPENS IN RUTHERFORDTON

The First Industrial Bank Opened Doors Wednesday—Authorized Capital Stock of \$100,000

Rutherfordton, June 21.—The First Industrial Bank opened its doors here Wednesday morning for business. The First Industrial Bank, Rutherford county's newest banking enterprise, was chartered in January of this year. An organization meeting was held about a month ago, at which time officers were elected and plans for the opening were made.

The bank is located at 216 N. Main Street, in the building formerly occupied by the Rutherfordton post-office which has been renovated and fitted up for the purpose. The new enterprise is capitalized at \$100,000. It has paid in capital stock of \$25,000. The bank will do a general industrial banking business, and solicits time deposits and savings accounts.

The officers are Charles H. Haynes, president; N. C. Harris, vice-president; David Lindsay, vice-president; B. H. Long, cashier. The board of directors are composed of the above officers and J. S. Dockery, C. B. Goodyear, and Fred D. Hamrick.

The men who are responsible for the bank are the leading business executives of the county. With an established faith in their town and county and its future, and seeing the need of such an institution these gentlemen have set out, not only to give the county another bank, but to give it an institution of service that will function for the common welfare and advancement of the county.

Mr. B. H. Long, of Forest City, who becomes cashier of the new bank, is prominently identified with banking in this county. He was, for several years, cashier of the Farmers Bank and Trust Company, of Forest City. After leaving the Farmers Bank he was connected with the Chimney Rock Mountains, Inc., as assistant treasurer until recently. His judgment on financial matters is safe and is invariably sought by hundreds

of people in the county, as they have long since come to know that his advice can be safely relied upon. He has not only proven himself to be a banker of the first rank, but is also a booster and a builder. His invaluable services will assist materially in bringing the new enterprise the success it deserves.

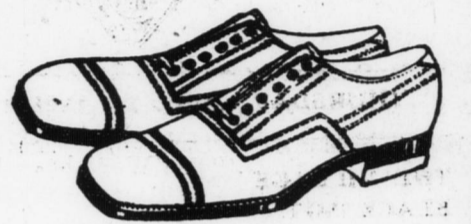
