> "Since the growing and fruiting period of the plant is limited to a very short time, the fertilizer must be applied in liberal amounts and in a readily available form. In two of the plots in this test, all the nitrogen is from a quickly available source. such as Nitrate of Soda, with part of it applied at planting and part as a side application. It will be interesting to watch the growth and fruiting of the cotton in each of these plots and the farmers therefore are urged to visit and observe this work," said Mr. Sutton today.


