At the beginning of the second round it was evident that it was but a few seconds before the end. At the end of one minute, "Jack" completely finished with a clean knock-out, which marked the most thrilling fight of his career.

Miss Kate Moore, who has been attending summer school at Nashville, Tenn., is at home.

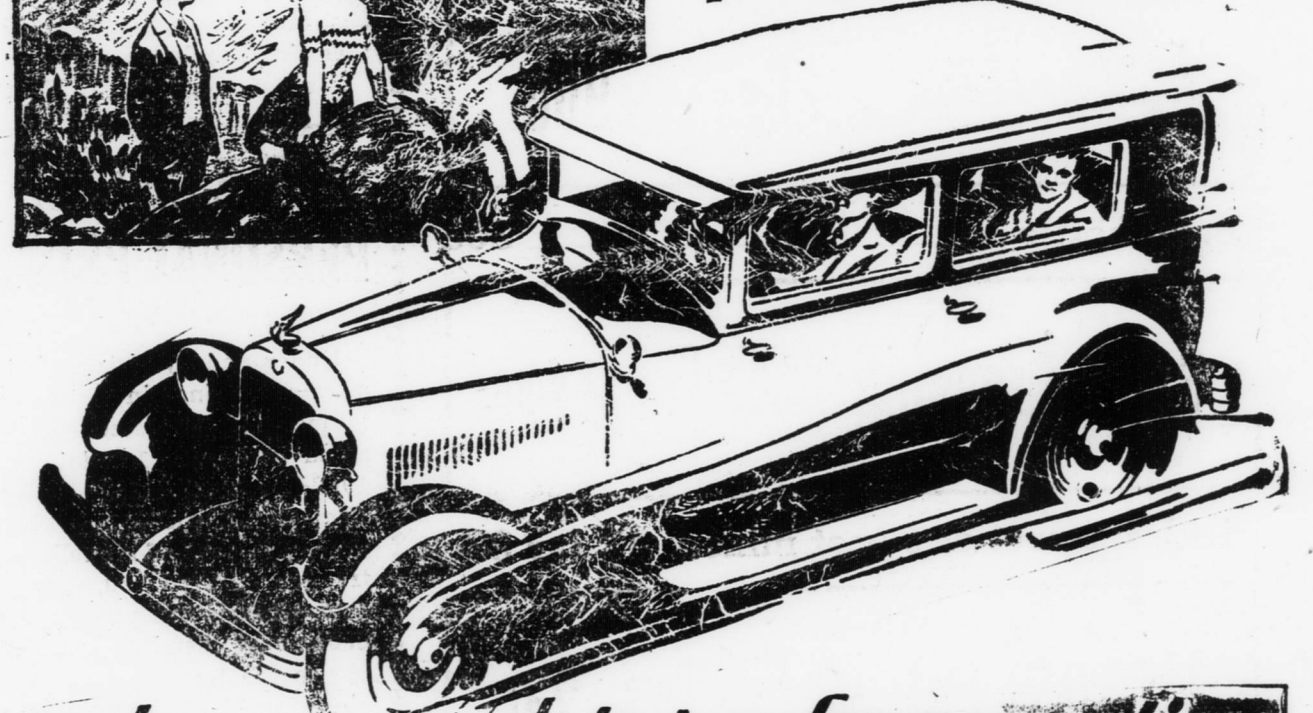

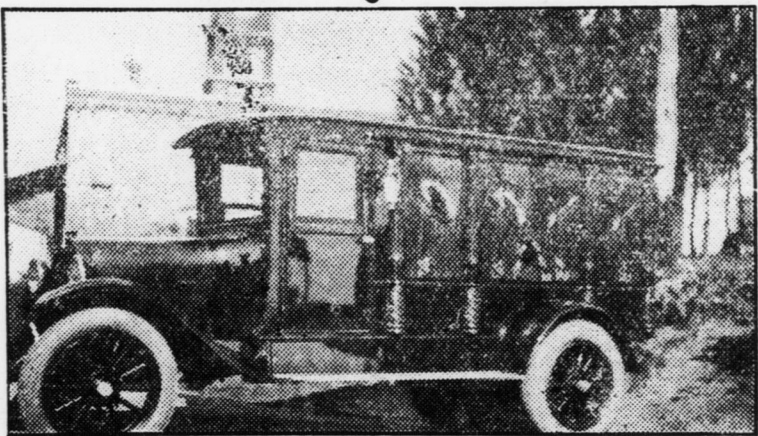
