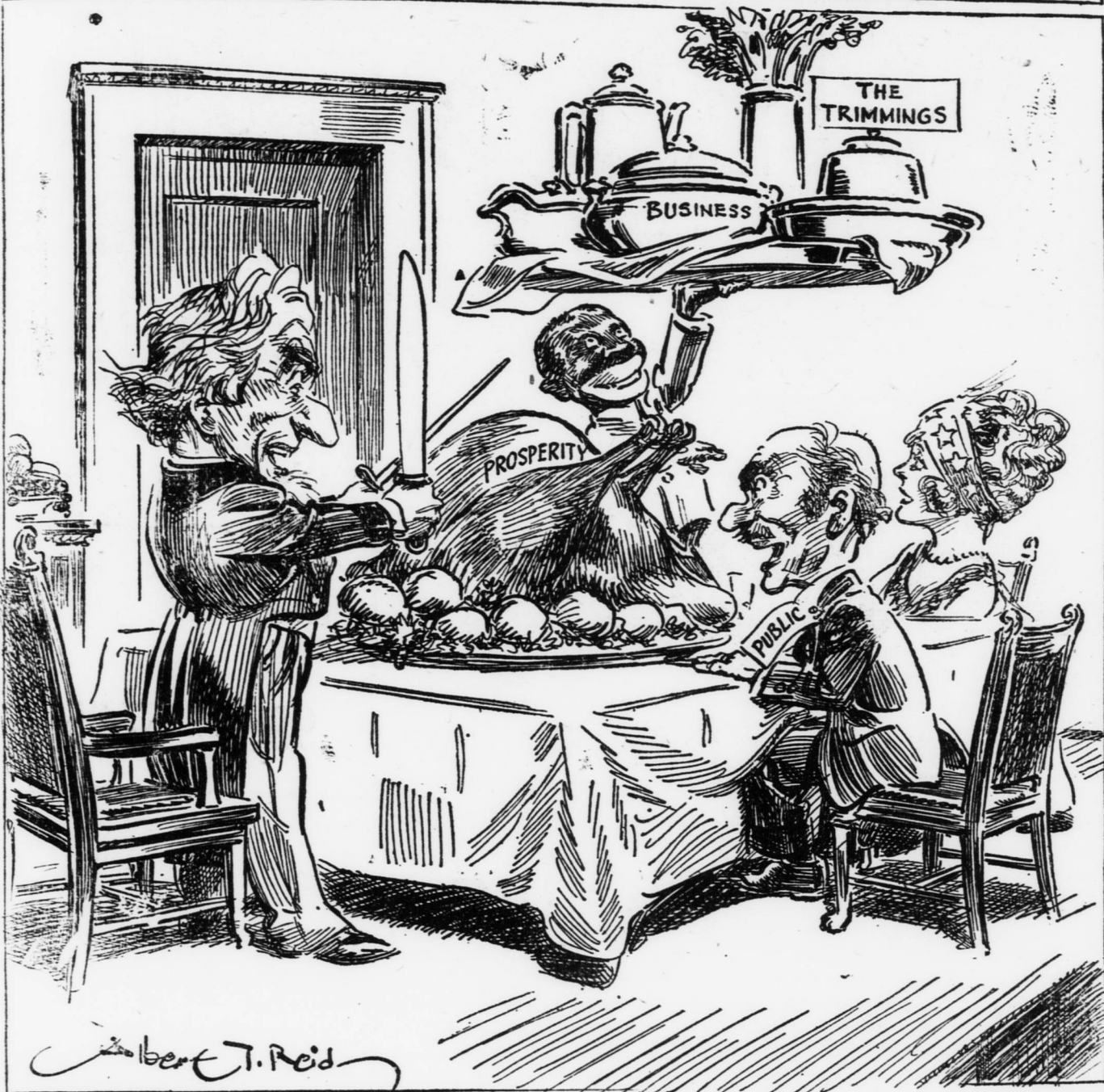


Our Turkey's Getting Bigger and Better
