Rutherfordton, May 8 .- Dr. F. W. H. Logan, candidate on the citizens' ticket, was elected mayor of Rutherfordton in Tuesday's election, over the present mayor, M. L. Justice. At a mass meeting of citizens sometime ago a citizens ticket was ominated, with Dr. Logan as mayor, nd B. D. Wilson, Mrs. A. A. Rucker, A. G. Harrelson and J. Linwood Robinson, as city commissioners. Later a Democratic ticket was nominated, with M. L. Justice, present mayor, as candidate, with R. R. Flack, A. G. Harrelson, J. H. Carpenter and J. Linwood Robinson as candidates for city commissioners. The results of Tuesday's election follows:
