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

Forest City is soon to have a new textile plant, operating eight thousand spindles and more than fifty Jacquard looms, according to Mr. J. M. Lumley, superintendent of the Ellenboro Manufacturing Company, who is engineering the project.

The new plant will be located about one mile south of Forest City, Mr. Holland is survived by four on the property of Mr. J. L. Butler, mill will be located close to the Southern Railroad, and near the state highway.

The new mill will use cotton, rayon and silk, says Mr. Lumley, and will manufacture tapestries, bedspreads, damasks, upholstering and other novelties. The plant will have an 8,000 spindle capacity and will operate about fifty or sixty Jacquard Looms, which will furnish employment to approximately one hundred people. The company will also construct tenant houses for their employees.
