Spindale, Dec. 11.-After entering its sixth week here indications are that the Stephens County-wide week, if not longer. Originally scheduled for four weeks, the meeting was prolonged an additional week on account of the great interest manifested in the services. It was announced that the services would close Wednesday night, but on Tuesday night approximately one hundred people were in the after meeting for prayer. With the interest now being shown, the sponsors of the meeting and Mr. Stephens consider it a tragedy to close the series of services at this stage. Nearly four thousand people were present Tuesday night for the services. Every available seat and chair was taken, and many stood for the services.

The Stephens meeting was opened here November 1st, and has been in progress continuously since. The huge tabelinacle, which will accomodate more than three thousand people comfortably, has been filled at nearly every service held. People from every community in Ruther-ford and adjoining counties have been in attendance at these services. Approximately six hundred conversions have resulted from the meeting, a number of reconsecrations, besides a fine spirit of fellowship between the churches of the county thus far.

He scored in no uncertain terms, the habit of profanity, immorality and drunkeness. He declared that immorality was the greatest sin of the age.
