

LARGE NUMBER ATTEND BALE PER ACRE BANQUET

Fifty-Seven Cool Springs Township Men Attend Banquet in Charlotte—Delegation Awarded Two Trophies.

Cool Springs department of vocational agriculture was represented at the "Bale-per-Acre" banquet at Charlotte last Friday, by 57 farmers and students. This banquet, which brought together 600 farmers from the 16 counties in the Charlotte district, was given by the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce and the Chilean Nitrate of Soda Educational Bureau. Rutherford county was well represented. The four agricultural schools had 150 representatives at the banquet.

The Cool Springs delegation brought back two prizes. Clark Matheny won first prize in the district for students of agriculture. His cotton project of 5 acres of Coker cotton had the best yield of any student in the 22 schools in the Charlotte district. It is highly probable that he will also receive state prize for students, as his record is much ahead of any reports so far in, but there are some schools not heard from. Sam Ruppe, of the Oakland section won third prize in the state for farmers who used Chilean Nitrate of Soda. Mr. Ruppe's prize plot was the same one that won first place in the county last year. Cool Springs had the second largest yield in the state also, in the plot of Mr. Tom Harris of Alexander, but this plot was not entered in time to win a prize.

The banquet was held in the Chamber of Commerce building in Charlotte and was preceded by a parade of the farmers and students. The speakers were: Arthur Dixon of Gastonia, president of the American Cotton Mfg. Association; The Mayor of Charlotte, the president and secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Boyd, Southern district representative of the Chilean Nitrate of Soda Educational Bureau, Roy H. Thomas, state supervisor of vocational agriculture, James M. Gray, state representative of the Chilean Nitrate of Soda Educational Bureau, and J. M. Osteen, district supervisor of vocational agriculture.

The Cool Springs delegation was accompanied by C. C. Erwin, high school principal, and D. H. Sutton, agricultural teacher. They had as their guest, county agent, F. E. Patton.
