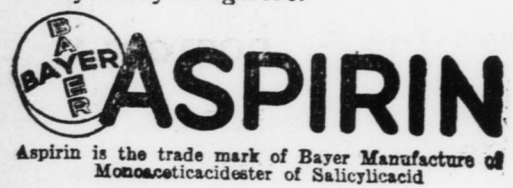
Mrs. Blanton died at the home of her step-son, Charles C. Blanton, head of the First National bank of Shelby.
