

YOUNG ELLENBORO WOMAN DEAD

Miss Lucy Wright Passes at Age 27—Funeral Service Held Thursday Afternoon.

Ellenboro, May 26.—The entire community was shocked to learn of the death of Miss Lucy A. Wright, aged 27, which occurred last Wednesday following an illness of about eight months of that dread disease, tuberculosis.

Funeral services were held from the Bethel Baptist church, at Ellenboro, Thursday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, in charge of Rev. I. D. Harrill. Interment was in the Bethel church cemetery.

Miss Wright was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Wright. She is survived by her parents, two brothers and one sister, Miss Maude Wright, all of Ellenboro.

Miss Wright had been a consistent member of the Ellenboro Presbyterian church for twelve years and had been a teacher of a Sunday school class until her illness prevented her taking an active part in church work. She was a devoted christian and was a member of the B. Y. P. U. of the Bethel Baptist church. She had practically given all of her young life to the service of the B. Y. P. U. and Sunday school work.

Typhoid and Diphtheria Preventative Campaign

Typhoid and Diphtheria Campaign starts June 2, 1930, and continues through July. These treatments are given free by the County Health Officer at the following places and dates. The people should avail themselves of these preventative measures. The above named diseases are quite common and often-times fatal therefore you should take advantage of these protective vaccinations to stamp them out as nearly as possible.

All children should have Toxin-Antitoxin against Diphtheria from six months to six years. These treatments are practically painless and harmless and I urge all parents to give their children these treatments. Consult your family physician and act upon his judgment in these matters.

I am making these dispensary points as convenient to the people as it is possible to do, to make it County-wide.

I appeal to the ministers, teachers, medical profession, Kiwanis, County Club, editors and all other agencies who are vitally interested in the preservation of the health of our people, to lend their influence in these matters. The good that can be accomplished is untold and invaluable, but depends almost entirely on the co-operation and interest that the public may take in these health measures.

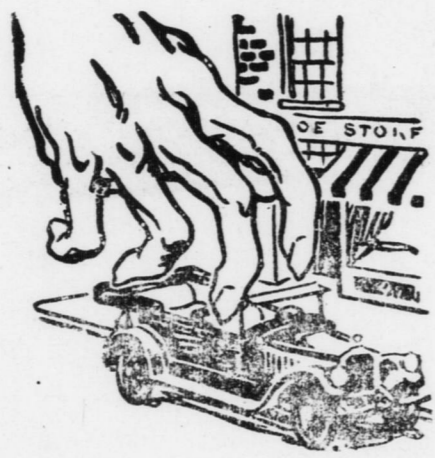
