

## GRASS IS BEST FEED YET IS VERY DECEIVING

### Authority Advises Grain Feeding In Summer.

When Professor G. Bohstedt, of the University of Wisconsin, spoke at the June convention of the Central Retail Feed Association in Milwaukee, he emphasized the fact that grass is the best, yet the most deceptive, of all livestock feeds.

Good grass is the nearest to a perfect feed that can be found, but short dry grass provides little nourishment, and especially is lacking in protein content, Professor Bohstedt said.

He urged that all farmers watch their pastures closely during July and August, saying that the grass deteriorates in value very rapidly when it begins to dry up, and that the pastures are likely to be much shorter than the farmer suspects unless he keeps a close eye on them.

Professor Bohstedt is a close student of feeding problems and has conducted a number of experiments testing the value of grass at its different stages. He has determined, along with many other experimenters, that dry grass alone will not produce milk in large quantities unless the cow draws upon her bodily resources, often resulting in permanent injury.

A ration of proved value, which can be depended on to produce the maximum amount of milk at low cost, while the cows are on lean pasture, consists of 200 pounds of ground corn, barley, or hominy, 200 pounds of ground oats; 100 pounds of wheat bran, and 100 pounds of linseed meal.

This ration should be fed at the rates of one pound of grain for each

six pounds of milk produced daily. Cows producing one pound or more of butterfat daily should receive one pound of the mixture daily for each four or five pounds of milk.

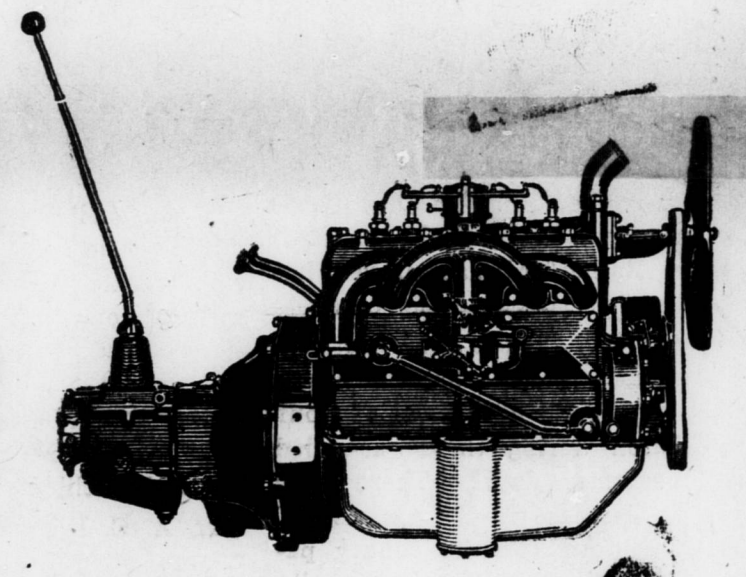

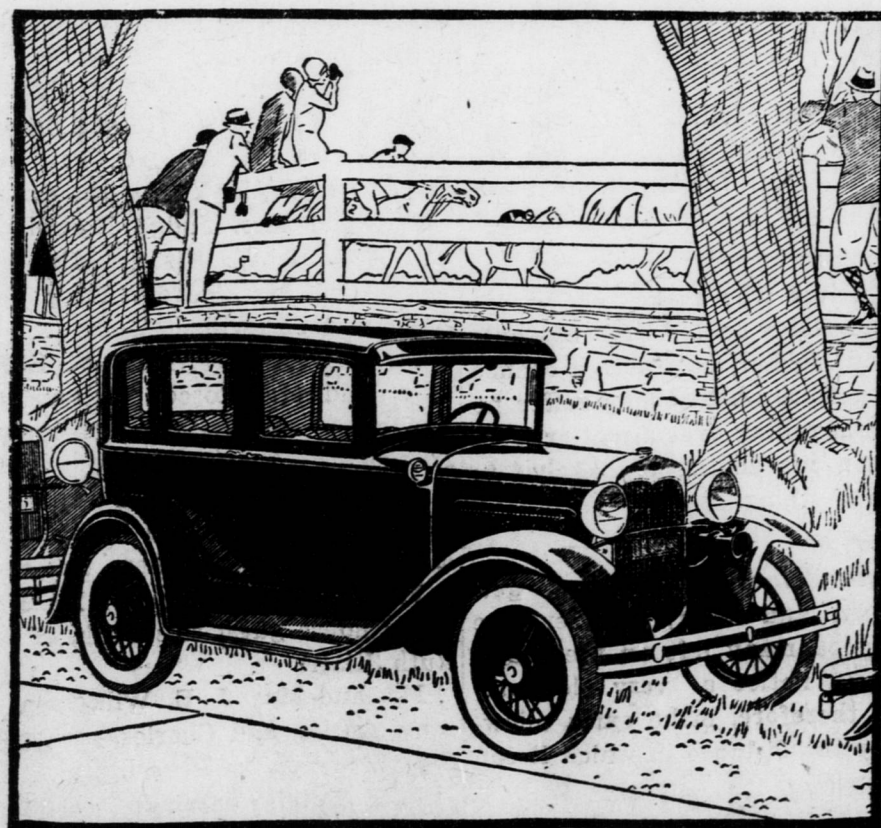
