We often sear our conscience so we again miss our warnings. Some people talk all the time and never say anything, just make a lot of noise. An empty wagon makes more noise than a loaded wagon. God has given us examples of warning of His displeasure and the punishment. The Flood; Sodom and Gomorrah; Pharaoh's hosts lost, Nebuchadrezzar, Belshashar and Herod. Warnings are so often unheeded. We should take warning first, to avoid suffering and save ourselves from future punishment. Let's be grateful and heed that warnings, for to be separated from Jesus eternally is Hell. If we take warning we have His word that we shall deliver our souls.

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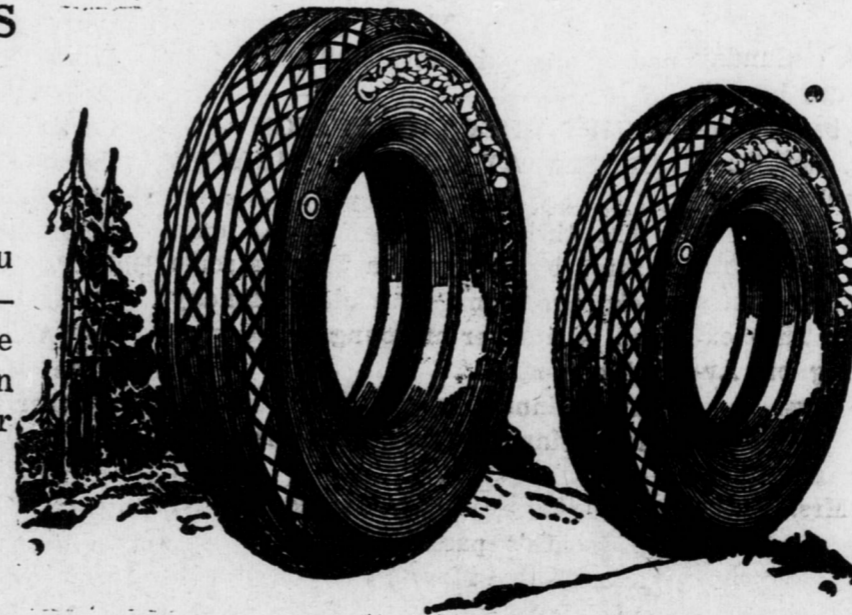
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
