

**LAST SURVIVOR
CO. D, 16TH REG.
DIED SUNDAY**

Aaron Wall, Aged 92, Passes
—Last Member of Burnt
Chimney Volunteers
Company.

Henrietta, July 8.—Mr. Aaron N. Wall one of the oldest and best known men of the county died at seven o'clock Sunday evening at his home near here. He was taken ill Sunday morning. Mr. Wall had apparently been expecting death for some time and had spoken of his going home and made preparations for everything. He was 92 years old Wednesday of last week, July 2, and died that morning: "I am ninety-two years old today. I may not live through the day as my time is about up." He was born July 2nd, 1838 and on October 10th 1860 he was married to Miss Suzanna Bridges and to this union ten children were born. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Suzanne Bridges Wall and the following children: Mrs. George Carpenter of Cliffside; Mrs. J. J. Edwards of Ellenboro; Mrs. Wayne Haynes of Avondale; Mrs. W. Z. Martin of Caroleen; Miss Bess Wall at home; Messrs A. H. Wall, Mooresboro; Mr. H. P. Wall, Mooresboro; and R. E. Wall at home; one brother, Mr. Johnny Wall who resides near the home of his late brother, besides 27 grand children and 23 great grand children.

Funeral services were held at High Shoals Baptist church where Mr. Wall had been a member for 58 years on Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. He had served as a deacon of this church since one month after he became a member and was a senior deacon at the time of his death. His pastor Rev. D. G. Washburn was in charge of the service assisted by Rev. J. A. Hunnicutt, pastor of Cliffside Baptist church who read several passages of Scripture, followed by prayer by Rev. I. D. Harrill after which a quartette composed of Messrs Theron and Fay Jolley, James Robinson and Roy Greene rendered a beautiful number. Then Rev. Z. D. Har-

ill spoke of the life of the deceased and of how often during the many years he served as Moderator of the Sandy Run Association he had appointed Mr. Wall on various committees and of his ready service at all times. Rev. Harrill was followed by Rev. J. M. Goode who also paid tribute to the splendid qualities of Mr. Wall. Next the Avondale Quartet composed of Messrs. C. H. Wilson, W. T. and Ed Huskey and Prof. F. S. Hall sang very effectively "Rock of Ages". Messrs Owen Padgett and Fay Jolley sang a duet.

The pastors speaking at the funeral told of the splendid life of Mr. Wall and said he was always a man of deep conviction and a man of prayer. One of the men in speaking said that there was an altar back in the pines at the rear of the home and he had been privileged to go to that altar for prayer with Mr. Wall.

The active pall bearers were grandsons of Mr. Wall; Messrs. Paul Carpenter, Roby Wall, Talmadge and Troy Edwards, Vernon Wall Herman Martin. The honorary pall bearers were Dr. T. C. Lovelace, Dr. Perry Wiseman, Messrs Z. O. Jenkins, George Jolley, Charles H. Haynes, P. C. Hawkins, J. B. Watkins, Dr. J. F. Whisnant, W. H. Haynes, S. Dobbins, Summie Robinson and A. M. Crawford.

The flowers were carried by Misses Oxie Edwards, Stella Flynn, Adelaide Wall, Muriel Carpenter, Lois Carpenter, Lola Wall, Vernie Wall Sybil Edwards, Dellaree Greene and Mrs. Mamie Edwards.

Last Survivor of Co. D.

Mr. Wall was the last surviving member of Company D, 16th Regiment, North Carolina Troops. This company was recruited in and around Forest City, and was known as The Burnt Chimney Volunteers. Mr. Wall volunteered for service on May 1, 1861. The Burnt Chimney Volunteers left the county and entered service on June 3, 1861. This was the first company to leave Rutherford for service in the War Between the States. Capt. H. D. Lee was the first commander, and the company was attached to the 16th Regiment, as Co. D, Col. Stowe commanding the regiment. Mr. Wall served through the war with honor, and was one of the twelve from this organization who were paroled at Appomattox on April 10, 1865.

**FAVORITE RECIPES
OF A FAMOUS CHEF**

Escalloped Beef Creole—Fry in three tablespoons drippings, until brown, two tablespoons finely chopped green peppers and one-half cup finely chopped onion. Add two cups tomatoes, one tablespoon sugar, one-third teaspoon whole cloves and allspice, and a piece of whole mace. Fry until fairly dry, stirring constantly. Pour in two cups of water to which has been added one tablespoon Worcestershire sauce. Dust with one-half teaspoon salt, and one-half teaspoon pepper. Cook slowly for ten minutes. Then add two tablespoons flour which has been mixed with a little cold water. Cook five minutes. Remove from fire and rub through a strainer. Add two tablespoons chopped parsley and pour over thin slices of left-over beef which have been placed in a glass baking dish. Bake in a hot oven for about ten minutes.

Andalusian Dressing For Romaine, Endive or Plain Lettuce—Mix together in a bowl one-half teaspoon mustard, one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sugar, one-eighth teaspoon paprika, one tablespoon lemon juice, one teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, one tablespoon tomato ketchup, one tablespoon cold water, and five tablespoons salad oil. Beat thoroughly with a fork and serve on the greens.
