A NEW SWINDLE.

Most people are usually interested in the latest form of swindles, and therefore we take pleasure in passing along a complete description of one which has been going the rounds in contemporary papers. The original expose of this swindle appeared in the Nebraska Farmer but it has been copied extensively:

"A letter from a Colorado subscriber advises us that two swindlers have been operating in his town selling advertising to business men to appear on a calendar. The spaces on the calendar, when fully sold, amount to \$130. These grafters said they were representing a publishing company at Marcus, Iowa. The advertising is sold to the merchants upon representations that 50 per cent of the money collected is to go to some particular church in town, but after Mr. Agent is through with the selling job and the money is in his pocket he is gone to greener fields, the business men receiving nothing for their money, nor does the church. Our subscriber asks us to give publicity to his transaction for the benefit of other ministers of churches and business men as well, as these men are frauds. He advises us that warrants are out for them and the publishing company informs him that they have no authority to represent them and they are now trying to locate these men. Any information

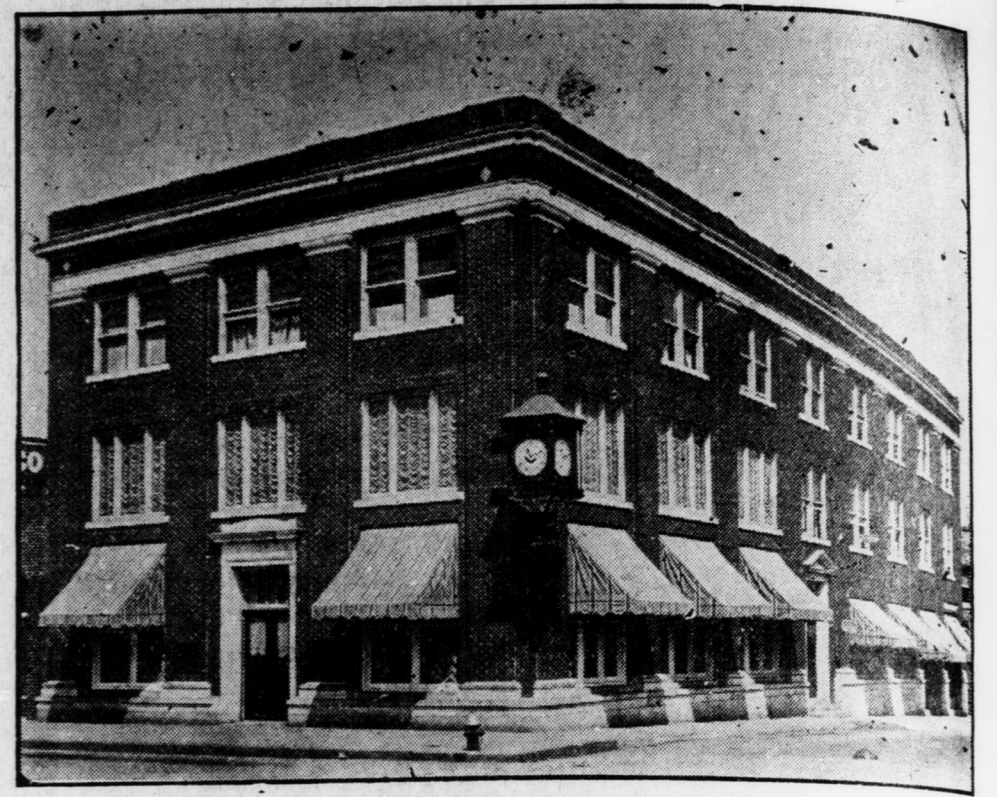

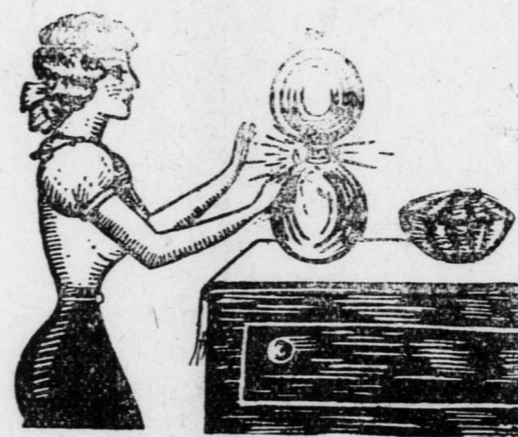
