CHINESE FUNERAL FILMED IN COLOR

For the first time in the history of the screen, as far as is known, an authentic Chinese funeral is staged in "Son of the Gods" the First National and Vitaphone production starring Richard Barthelmess which comes to the Romina Theatre next Monday and Tuesday.

This sequence, done entirely in Technicolor, was enacted on an outdoor set covering ten city blocks. Hundreds of Chinese men, women and children were employed to people this fragment of San Francisco's Chinatown.

The procession, an impressive ceremonial, consisted of a series of legend-bearing banners carried on the shoulders of friends of the deceased; a score of paid female mourn-

ers, their faces covered with sacks and sobbing constantly; the leader of the procession clapping a pair of cymbals; black carriages, etc. The sequence was supposed to occur twenty years ago and therefore the American spectators on the sidelines were dressed in the styles of the period—long skirts, high collars, derbies, etc. This scene is a flashback in the story and relates how Barthelmess as a child came to be adopted by a Chinese father.

"Son of the Gods" was directed by Frank Lloyd. Constance Bennett has the feminine lead. It is entirely in dialogue and retains the dramatic flavor and punch of Rex Beach's powerful novel of the same name.
