Boxing Matches At Fair Saturday

The fight card at the Rutherford Fair ground last Saturday evening was well attended and much interest shown. The fight was held in the exhibit hall. Jack Blanton, of Cliffside, and John Price, of Forest City, scheduled for a six round championship fight of Rutherford county, gave the spectators their money's worth. A broken finger in the fifth round caused the withdrawal of Price and the fight was awarded to Blanton, who is now the undisputed champion of the county. It was the opinion of ring-siders that Blanton had the fight won on points before the injury to his hand caused the withdrawal of Price.

Jack Evans, of Thomasville, refereed the match. The main bout was between two negroes, Ambrose Taylor, of Forest City, who claims the championship of western North Carolina, and Irvin Segram, of Thomasville, who claims the eastern Carolina title. Taylor won over Segram in the ninth inning by a knock out. An amusing feature of the bout was a battle royal in which seven negroes from Rutherford, Cleveland, Polk and Henderson counties participated.

Price and Blanton will fight here again within about three weeks. At the same time Joe Steadman, negro, of Greensboro, will meet Ambrose Taylor, of Forest City. Price will also meet Harry Fayles, of the Wilmington police force at the police field day exercises in Charlotte October 24.
