# ARMISTICE DAY **CELEBRATION IS** WELL ATTENDED

Several Thousand People Throng Streets Here all Day Tuesday-Judge Johnson Speaks.

An address by Walter L. Johnson, of Asheville, a parade and a hard fought football game were only a few of the features of the big Armistice Day celebration staged here Tuesday. Several thousand people were in attendance and the entire affair was a huge success.

In all 278 veterans of the World war, several veterans of the Spanish-American war and a few Confederate veterans registered Tuesday morning and were served dinner by the ladies of the city. The registration of ex-service men was the first part of the day's program. At 10:30 a parade, composed of World war veterans, city officials and a number of decorated automobiles and floats paraded through the business district. This was followed with a memorial service for the World war dead, which took place at a memorial monument erected in honor of Rutherford's boys who made the supreme sacrifice during the World war.

Judge Walter L. Johnson, of Asheville, then delivered the Armistice Day address in the Romina Theatre. Amplifiers were placed in front of the building in order that all could hear. He was heard by a large crowd. The theme of Mr. Johnson's address was peace and good-will.


