

MRS. W. R. HILL IS CALLED BY DEATH

Wife of Former County Superintendent Passes in Philadelphia Hospital After Operation.

Rutherfordton, Nov. 17.—Mrs. W. R. Hill, aged 40, died Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock, in Philadelphia in the University of Pennsylvania hospital. Mrs. Hill was taken there about six weeks ago for treatment, and three weeks ago she underwent a major operation on her head. She was thought to be improving, but complications set in last week, which caused her death Thursday.

The body arrived in Kings Mountain Friday morning at 10:50 o'clock. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock with her pastor, Rev. E. B. Jenkins, in charge of the service. Interment was in the Rutherfordton cemetery, 11th, at two o'clock. The baby was Mrs. Hill is survived by her husband, four children, two brothers,

C. B. and M. D. Justice, of Rutherfordton; one half-brother, James D. Justice, of Salisbury; and a half sister, Mrs. Byron Carson, of Rutherfordton.

Her husband was county superintendent of Rutherford county schools from 1914 to September 12, 1925, when he resigned. He is now principal of the Rutherfordton elementary school.

Mrs. Hill was a loyal member of the First Baptist church here and was an active member of the daughters of the Confederacy. She was a talented musician and was held in high esteem. She was a daughter of the late James D. Justice, of Rutherfordton.
