

### CHIMNEY ROCK MOUNTAINS SOLD

#### Property Brings \$800,000 Under Foreclosure Sale—Two Cases in Supreme Court.

Rutherfordton, Nov. 24.—One of the largest foreclosure sales ever held in Rutherford county took place here last Thursday at noon when a deed of trust executed by Chimney Rock Mountains, Inc., dated December 1, 1925 to the Central Bank and Trust Co., of Asheville was bid in for \$800,000. The bid was made by the Consolidated Realty Co., and included the real estate holdings of the Chimney Rock Mountains, Inc., and was approximately 6,000 acres of land, lying in and around Lake Lure. It included all the holdings of the Chimney Rock Mountains, Inc., except the lake and dam, which was sold some time ago to another firm.

#### Cases in High Court.

Rutherford county will have two

cases in the State Supreme Court in Raleigh next week, viz: The Chimney Rock Co. vs. Lake Lure Town in which the former is asking to be exempt from the corporate limits of the latter. The Chimney Rock Co. is that portion of the famous resort on which is located the famous "Rock," Cliff Dwelling cottages, pavillion and private road. The other case is Rutherford County vs. Hendersonville Real Estate Company.
