

## ANOTHER STEP FOR NEW POSTOFFICE

Government Has Asked For Bids on Survey of Site and Building.

Rutherfordton, Dec. 15.—Another step was taken here towards Rutherfordton getting a new Federal Postoffice building when Postmaster John H. Williams received six sets of specifications and drawings for survey of site of the U. S. Postoffice. Blue prints showing the outline, location, etc., were enclosed.

The letter was from Jas. A. Wetmore, acting Supervising Architect of the U. S. Treasury Dept., Wash-

ington, D. C., and states in part as follows:

"You are requested to invite proposals for the work by the public posting of notices and also by circular letter addressed to parties in your city or vicinity who are competent to do work. As this work is not advertised in a local newspaper or in any of the Technical journals of the United States, and as it is desired to have as much competition as possible, it would be appreciated if you would make a special effort to interest competent parties to submit a bid. Proposals, in order to receive consideration, must be forwarded direct to this office unopened, in time to be received on or before the hour fixed in the specification, which is Dec. 16th, at 2 p. m."

Postmaster Williams feels sure that the new building will be erected soon, possibly next year and will be similar to Shelby's Federal building, only larger and of a later design.

The Kiwanis club and other civic organizations will use every effort to get Congress to appropriate the necessary funds this session for the building.

The Government has owned a postoffice site here on South Main street for some fifteen or twenty years, opposite the home of Mr. W. Amos Harrill.

If the building is erected next year it will mean the expenditure of a considerable sum of money in this community and will give employment to many men and will do much to help enliven business and relieve unemployment.
