"REMOTE CONTROL" AT HORN'S THEATRE

Recording radio broadcasting for dramatic scenes in William Haines new talkie, "Remote Control," playing at Horn's Theatre, Friday and Saturday, required the operation of two separate recording systems on the same set at the Metro-Goldwyn Mayer studio.

Because of the difference in electrical impulses making up the sound frequencies, the voices on the set could not be "mixed" with the voices coming in through a radio as demanded by the plot.

Through a portable broadcast arrangement, the radio voices went through a recording system where the impulses were slowed down or speeded up to the frequencies of the recording microphones on the set, the second recording system catching the dialogue on the set and matching it with the radio talks.

Edward Sedgwick directed the picturization of the New York stage success with Mary Doran playing opposite Haines. The cast also includes Charles King, John Miljan, Polly Moran, J. C. Nugent, Edward Nugent, Wilbur Mack and James Donlan.

KIWANIS CLUB ACTIVE IN 1930

Local Organization Has Accomplished Much During Year Just Closed.

During the past year the Forest City Kiwanis Club has accomplished much in sponsoring constructive measures for the city and county. The Kiwanis motto, "We Build" has been kept in mind, and the club has steadily pushed forward, accomplishing many of the objects which had been set as a goal. Mr. Howard Doggett gave a brief outline at the meeting Monday evening, December 29, touching upon the work of the Club. Among the matters mentioned by him were:

During the year joint meetings have been held with the Rutherfordton Kiwanis Club, the Henrietta-Caroleen Lions Club, the Tryon Kiwanis club and the County Club, Textile Club and Rutherfordton Kiwanis Clubs. The Lions Club were entertained here once by the local club, and a joint meeting was held with them at Cliffside. A joint meeting was held in Tryon with that club, and the Tryon club held one meeting here with the local club. A joint meeting was held with the Rutherfordton Kiwanis club, the County Club and the Lions' club at Rutherfordton, while the Rutherfordton Kiwanis club held a joint meeting here.

Special entertainment features have been Farmers' night, Ladies' night and Teachers' and Ladies' night. A picnic was given for the Kiwanians by the farmers at Mr. Doggett's farm last summer, and the Kiwanis club later held a special meeting for the farmers.

The club has sponsored several worth-while events in the city. Among them were the National Music week, the cotton contest, the Isaac Walton League's drive for re-establishing license sales in county; "second Monday" or Trade Day; debt paying checks and erected air marker. The club jointly sponsored a farmer's tour to the Coker farms at Hartsville. The air marker has been painted on the Hewitt building, opposite the post office. Dr. A. C. Duncan brought the attention of the club to Babson's idea of circulation debt paying checks, and there has recently been put into circulation a number of certified checks for \$5.00, which require twenty-five signatures before cashing at the bank. It is estimated that by this method several thousand dollars in debts will be paid. The club was active in sponsoring Trade Day, or Second Monday here, and part of the program included the placing of large signs in front of each business house advertising specials for each Second Monday.

The Kiwanis club has co-operated with the city in placing Christmas decorations; beautifying the city for the Christmas holidays; co-operated with the Family Welfare Association; Armistice Day celebration and with the authorities in the establishment of a star route from Marion to Shelby. The beautifying of the city at Christmas time has brought forth many comments from visitors and newspapers over the entire state, and has given the city much valuable publicity and advertising. The club rendered much valuable assistance in the recent Armistice Day celebration, while the whole hearted support of the Welfare Association, by the club, makes the work of the charity organization easier.

The club has been represented at the International and state conventions during the past year. Prof. Charles Erwin was the delegate to the International convention, held in Atlantic City, N. J., while B. T. Jones and Howard Doggett were delegates to the state convention in Raleigh.

During the year the following Kiwanians have been especially active in lending their personal efforts to the sponsoring of some particular object. Dr. R. R. Howes spent much time in the interest of Music Week in the city. D. H. Sutton, J. W. Matheny and Terry Moore sponsored the cotton contest, and devoted considerable time to see that it was successfully carried out. John Dalton was the "father" of the Trade Day idea; Dr. A. C. Duncan championed the cause of Babson's debt paying checks; Bryant Harrill sponsored the erection of an airplane marker on the Hewitt Building. Charles Plack and M. P. Bodie are club representatives on the Family Welfare Com-

mittee; Dr. Duncan and J. T. Harris were Armistice Day celebration representatives from the club; and T. T. Long sponsored the establishment of the star mail route from Shelby to Rutherfordton. F. I. Barber has worked faithfully toward keeping up the attendance of the club.
