Young Ex-Service Man Passes—Brother of Lloyd Williamson—Funeral Held Sunday.

Oteen, Jan. 5.—James Williamson, aged 38, died in the United States Veteran's hospital here Thursday, where he had been confined for nine years and three days as a result of illness contracted while serving with the A. E. F., in France. A short funeral service was held at Oteen with Chaplain Wayne Williams in charge. His body was taken to his home in Sally, Aiken county, South Carolina, where services were held Sunday morning at eleven o'clock with Rev. Mr. Jones in charge, assisted by Rev. Mr. Bennett. Interment was in the Sally cemetery.
