

STATE LICENSING OF DRIVERS IN BENNETT BILL

Goldsboro Senator Has Measure Seeking to Abolish State Patrol.

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—Senators Kelly Bennett, of Bryson City, and Hugh Dortch, of Goldsboro, have clashed on their bills concerning the maintenance and operation of the state highway patrol.

Senator Dortch would abolish the patrol as unnecessary and in the interest of economy; the Swain county solon seeks to increase it to one superintendent, one assistant superintendent, three captains, three first sergeants, eight sergeants, ten corporals and 100 patrolmen. The present plan calls for a captain and one lieutenant and three patrolmen in each of the nine highway districts. The superintendent, under Senator Bennett's bill, would have charge. He would take the place held by captain under the present arrangement.

Revenue for maintenance of the patrol would be derived from provisions of a companion bill, introduced by the senator, and entitled "an act to provide for the licensing

the act. Cards would be furnished to the private operators, and metal badges to the public chauffeurs.

According to the proposed Bennett bill, every court "having jurisdiction over offenses committed under this act or any other act regulating the operation of motor vehicles upon the highways shall forthwith revoke licenses of any person upon conviction of any of the following crimes:"

"1. Manslaughter resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle.

"2. Driving a vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquors or narcotic drugs.

"3. Perjury or the making of a false affidavit to the Department under this act or any other law of this state requiring the registration of motor vehicle or regulating their operation on highways.

"4. Any crime punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of this state or any other felony in the commission of which a motor vehicle is used.

"5. Conviction or forfeiture of bail upon three charges of reckless driving all within the preceding twelve months.

"6. A conviction of a driver of a motor vehicle, involved in an accident resulting in the death or injury of another person, upon a charge of failing to stop and disclose his identity at the scene of the accident.

"(b) Any person convicted of operating a motor vehicle while the license of such person is suspended or revoked, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined or imprisoned within the discretion of the court.

Other Features.

Other features of the proposed bill are:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or knowingly permit any minor under the age of eighteen years to drive a motor vehicle upon a highway as an operator, unless such minor shall have first obtained a license to so drive a motor vehicle under the provisions of this act.

"This state and every county, city, municipal or other public corporation within this state employing any

operator or chauffeur shall be jointly and severally liable with such operator or chauffeur for any damages caused by the negligence of the latter, while driving a motor vehicle upon a highway in the course of his employment.

"Funds collected hereunder shall be kept by the State Treasurer in a separate fund to be known and designated as state highway patrol fund and to be used only for the maintenance of the State Highway Patrol and all moneys directed to be paid out under this article shall be paid by the state treasurer upon voucher issued by the Commissioner and charged to the state highway of motor vehicle operators and chauffeurs and to the liability of certain persons for negligence in the operation of motor vehicles on the public highways and to make uniform the law relating thereto, the enforcement thereof, and to provide for its operation."

A state license of \$1.25 for private operators, and \$5 for public chauffeur's licenses would be provided by patrol fund. All necessary expenses of collecting the said license fees including clerical assistance, the cost of blanks, books and other supplies as cannot be furnished by the state printer, shall be paid for monthly from the revenue derived from the said fees by warrant of the auditor on the state treasurer; and said expenses shall be approved by the commission."

The bill would prohibit any city or county, from levying any tax or requiring a license from any operator of an automobile or public chauffeur, licensed by the state.

Senator Bennett estimates the revenues from such an act would total at least \$750,000, which would net the state a profit of several hundred thousand dollars in addition to providing state regulation of automobiles and the public highways.

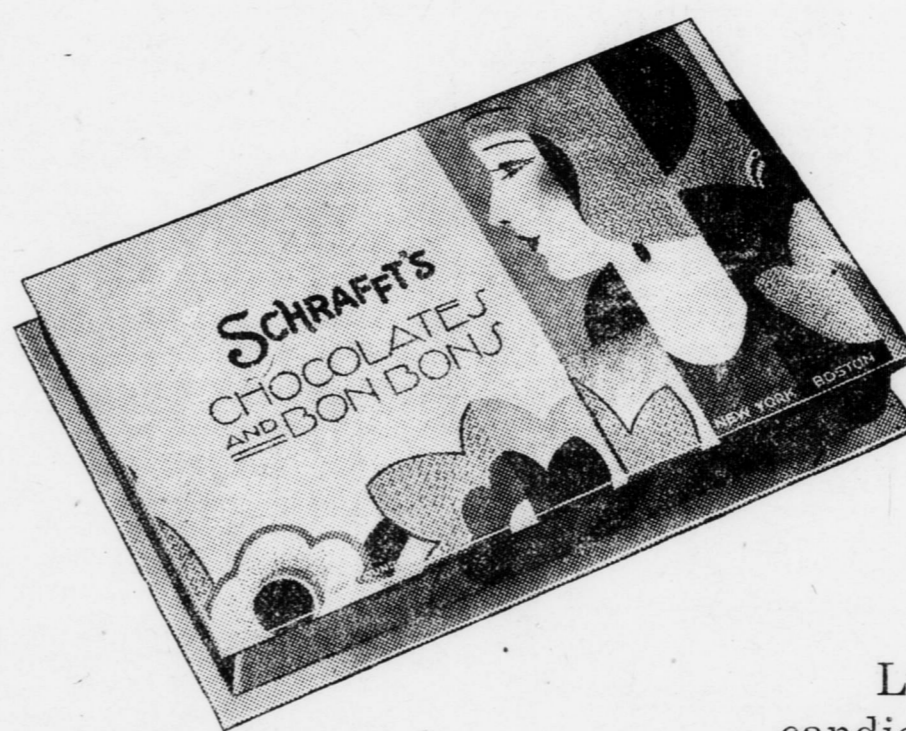
