DROPS CAGE TITLE IN STATE FINALS

Runner-up in State Championship Series Loses Final Game to Conway High School.

The Rutherfordton-Spindale Central high basketball team, county champions and western North Carolina champions, lost by a few points the state championship crown Saturday night in Raleigh.

Thirty or more teams were eligible and participated in the state tournament. Central High won each game played until matched with Conway High school in the finals in Saturday night. The tournament was held at the State college gym.

Thirty-two teams were lined up Thursday morning in the Class B starting off. Central Hi was matched with Candor and won by a 34-9 score. On Friday two elimination rounds were played. In the first Central High defeated Parkton 33 to 24, and in the afternoon round defeated Green Hope 21 to 17. In the semifinals Central High met Bakersville and Conway opposed Derita. Little difficulty was experienced in eliminating Bakersville, while Conway won over Derita. In the finals which were played Saturday night for state championship between Central High and Conway, Central high took second place when she was handed a 13 to 26 defeat by the husky Northampton county cagers.

Central High has enjoyed an unusually good basketball season. The team recently won the Class A championship title in the county, and for the second year in succession the large silver basketball, emblematic of the championship of the Western Conference of the Western North Carolina High School Athletic Association, rests in the hands of Central High school.

During the season the Central High cagers have scored a total of 1149 points as compared with 496 points made by their opponents. This does not include the state tourna--

W. C. Hardin May Collect Back Taxes

Raleigh, March 11.-W. C.
