

COUNTY CLUB AND IZAAK WALTONS MEET JOINTLY

J. Q. Gilkey and J. G. K. McClure Speakers—Club Endorses Cotton Institute Movement—Asks for Fishing Licenses.

Spindale, April 20.—More than sixty-five were in attendance at the regular meeting of the Rutherford

County Club and the Rutherford County chapter, Izaak Walton League, held jointly in the Spindale House here Friday at one o'clock.

Hon. J. Q. Gilkey, of Marion, and Mr. James G. K. McClure, of Asheville, members of the board of Department of Conservation and Development, were present and spoke. Hon. J. H. Harrelson, director of the Department of Conservation and Development, who was scheduled to speak, was unable to be present.

Miss Aylene Edwards, teacher in the Spindale school, and president of the Junior Woman's Club, of Rutherfordton, told of a cotton institute which will be held soon, outlined the program, and asked the club to endorse the movement. This was done unanimously.

On motion the Club adopted a resolution requesting the Seaboard Railroad to continue to maintain its depot at Bostic as at present, and petitioned the railroad to establish a train for passenger service from Rutherfordton to Charlotte, operating on an early morning schedule, and returning to Rutherfordton late in the afternoon.

Rev. J. A. Hunnicutt extended an invitation to all to attend the Older Boys' conference in Cliffside this week.

The president, G. B. Howard, then turned the program over to the chairman of the program committee, David Lindsay, who presented J. Q. Gilkey, of Marion, a member of the state department of Conservation and development Board he spoke of the wonderful co-operation that had been received by the board from the western North Carolina counties, and told of the work being done by the five hatcheries maintained in western North Carolina.

Mr. McClure spoke on the general phases of the work of the department, and told of some of the difficulties encountered in administering the program in the eastern

North Carolina counties. Mr. McClure urged the Club to take some action toward having fishing licenses re-instated in this county, as the fisheries department maintain the hatcheries with this license fee, and carries on a large work with this sum. Dr. L. B. Morse stated that thousands took advantage of fishing in Lake Lure daily, and many of them were from other counties. He pointed out that many of these came to Lake Lure to fish in order to evade the license fee in their home counties, and urged the license tax to be re-instated in order to eliminate much of this fishing.

On motion to appoint a committee to go before the commissioners in regard to the matter, it was decided to make the Izaak Walton League a committee as a whole, and let them work out plans for such conference with the commissioners.

Prof. Clyde A. Erwin awarded prizes to the three boys and three girls who won in the essay contest recently sponsored by the Izaak Walton League. Christine McBrayer, of the Forest City grammar school was awarded a kodak as first prize; Pauline Ensley, of Brittain school, was awarded a year's subscription to Nature Magazine as second prize; and Dee Roberts, of the Oakland school, was given a croquet set as third prize. In the boys' contest, Davis Hunnicutt, of Cliffside, was awarded a rod and reel as first prize; James Pegram, of Oakland, a year's subscription to "Outdoor Life," as second prize, and Jame Wright, of Mt. Vernon, was given a Boy Scout knife, as third prize.

A meeting of the board of directors was held immediately after the adjournment, at which time some matters of a confidential nature were discussed.
