

OAK GROVE TO GET NEW CHURCH SOON

Will Build \$10,000 Modern Brick Structure to Replace Present Church.

Bostic, R-3, April 20.—The congregation of the Oak Grove Methodist church are planning on building a modern brick church to replace the present structure at an early date. The plans for the new church are being drawn up by Mr. James, of Durham, N. C., and it is estimated that the new building will cost approximately \$10,000. To date, about \$3,000 has been secured for carrying out the work. Under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. J. N. Snow, it is expected that the entire amount can be raised soon. It is understood that some work will be done toward building the new structure.

This is the oldest Methodist congregation in Rutherford county, and is also the largest. During its 135 years of history it has been the outstanding Methodist church in Rutherford county, and one of the most progressive in the district.

The first church at Oak Grove was built about 1796. The first itinerant Methodist minister to visit the community was one by the name of Robertson. His circuit extended from East Tennessee across the Blue

Ridge into North Carolina as far as old Trinity church in what is now Cleveland county. About 1791 this circuit rider began stopping at the home of Mr. Jeremiah Blanton, who lived near the present cemetery, and close to where the Southern Railway now runs. His home soon became a regular preaching place, and a church with a small membership was formed. In 1796 the first church was built of logs by Mr. Blanton and his sons near the site of the present church. From that date until now the church has continued to grow, until it has one of the largest congregations of any church in the county.

Active work in building the church will begin about fall.
