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Special Rail Rates Are Granted Boy Campers

Chimney Rock, April 29.—In order to encourage more boys from distant points to attend summer camp this season in the mountains of Western North Carolina, the Seaboard Air Line railway has just granted a rate of one way plus 25 cents for round trip over its line for parties of boys attending Chimney Rock camp, at Lake Lure.
