### HOLD PRESBYTERY AT BRITTAIN

Semi-Annual Session of Kings Mountain Presbytery Held at Historic Britain Church.

Rutherfordton, R-4, April 27.—The semi-annual session of the Kings Mountain Presbytery opened Tuesday morning, April 21, at Britain church. Retiring Moderator Rev. R. J. Hunter preached the introductory sermon from First Peter, 56th verse, "The Mighty Hand of God." He gave comforting assurance in these times of turmoil and change. Revs. G. W. Mickel of Cherryville and J. K. Hall of Goshen church presided and dispensed with the Communion.

Dr. H. N. McDiarmid of Shelby, read a splendid memorial to the late Dr. Isaac Stuart McElroy, D. D., father of Rev. I. S. McElroy, pastor of the Rutherfordton Presbyterian church. Dr. McDiarmid was elected Moderator of the Presbytery, after which the body adjourned for lunch which was served by the ladies of the church in the old dining room of Westminster school.

In the afternoon the Presbytery had its usual experience of being invited to five different churches for the next session and decided to meet with Unity church in Gaston county, which has a new house of worship.

A number of overtures to the General Assembly, meeting in May at Montreat, touching various important matters came up.

Discussing the question of dancing at Davidson college, which has been agitated recently in certain church papers, the Presbytery took firm action opposing dances under auspices of church schools, or organizations of church schools.

At the evening session Home Mission work of the Presbytery was discussed by Rev. D. M. McGeachy of Tryon, and Rev. W. T. Smith of Unity church. The Home Mission report carried an expression of deep appreciation of the faithful service and interest in Home Missions of the late C. E. Neisler of Kings Mountain, a member of this committee.

Rev. T. C. Bryan of the First Presbyterian church, Gastonia, was elected temporary secretary.

Wednesday the Presytery discussed various things of interest to the work of the church. The attendance was good at both days. The people of Britain displayed unusual hospitality to the delegates. The Presbytery covers five counties: Rutherford, Polk, Cleveland, Gaston and Lincoln.

Wednesday morning Dr. W. S. Wilson of Lincolnton, preached an able sermon on the "Personality of God."

Rev. T. M. Stribling, new pastor at Spindale and Forest City, was received as a member of the Presbytery.

Every pastor and every church in the Presbytery was represented. The Presbytery adjourned at 1 p. m. Wednesday. It was a profitable session.

### DR. FOSTER A. SONDELY SUCCEUMS AT ASHEVILLE

Asheville, April 20.—Dr. Foster A. Sondley, 73, one of western North Carolina's most distinguished lawyers and historians, died at 11 o'clock Friday morning at his home in the Haw Creek valley on the outskirts of Asheville.

Death followed an illness of less than 20 hours. He was stricken with pneumonia Thursday night and complications developed shortly after 2 o'clock Friday morning.

Dr. Sondley was recognized as one of the outstanding historians of western North Carolina. He served sometime as a member of the North Carolina Historical Commission, and was the author of several interesting monographs on western North Carolina history.

### Cliffside Boy Is British Contributor

Mr. William Allhands, of Cliffside, is a contributor to "Doggy Tales," published recently by The Mitre Press, of London, England. This book carries a number of short stories by contributors from all over the world. Mr. Allhands has the distinction of being the only contributor from the United States to this interesting book, which is meeting with a splendid reception throughout the British Empire and elsewhere. Mr. Allhands' contribution is an original true story.

Rev. S. N. Watson of Forest City, was recently elected pastor of Mt. Creek Baptist church. Rev. Watson is a well known and able minister and was formerly pastor of the Forest City Baptist church.

### Aged Woman Dies On Birthday

Rutherfordton, R-4, April 27.—Mrs. Nancy Louise Freeman Baber died at her home at Logan Station, April 14th, on her 85th birthday. She was sick about six days.

The funeral service was conducted at Cedar Grove Methodist church by Rev. R. T. Baker, who was assisted by Rev. J. N. Snow.

The Mt. Vernon choir sang several beautiful selections. The flower girls were granddaughters as follows: Misses Wileen and Beth Baber, Mary Kate and Daisy Deck, Mrs. H. H. Freeman and Mrs. Clifton Bridges. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Glenn and Bill Deck, Cardie and Spurgeon Freeman, Clifton Bostic and Hunter Biggerstaff.

On October 23, 1866 she was united in marriage to William O. Baber. To this union eight children were born. Seven of whom survive her, one having died in infancy. The children are: J. G. Baber, Bostic; W. A. Baber, Ellenboro; S. M. Baber and B. C. Baber, Rutherfordton, R-4; O. R. Baber, Montrose, Ga.; Mrs. A. W. Deck, Rutherfordton, R-4, and Miss Ina Baber, Rutherfordton, R-4. Her husband preceded her to the grave thirty-three years ago.

Eighteen grandchildren survive her and eleven great grandchildren. She is also survived by four brothers, D. D. Freeman, Bostic; W. M. Freeman, Forest City; Henderson Freeman, Marietta, Okla.; and T. R. Freeman, Bostic. Three brothers preceded her to the grave.

Mrs. Baber joined Lebanon Baptist church in early girlhood and was a member of this church at her death. She was a noble Christian woman and we rejoice with her loved ones in the assurance she had of eternal life. Her funeral was attended by a large crowd of sorrowing friends and relatives. Her grave in the Cedar Grove cemetery was covered with many beautiful flowers. She made her home with her daughter, Mrs. A. W. Deck and family. She enjoyed a wide circle of friends and relatives.

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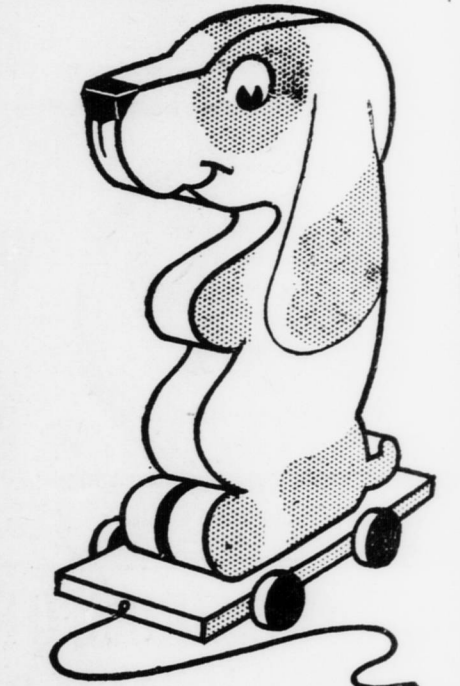

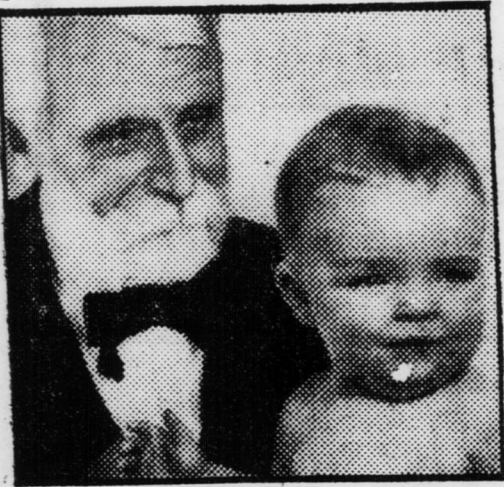
