EAST AVONDALE.

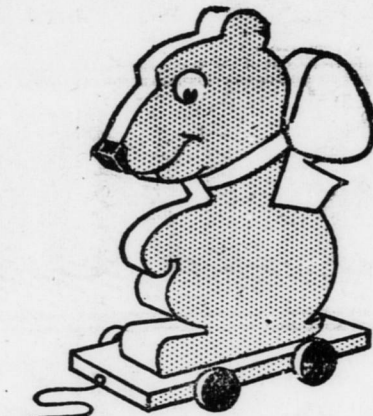
Avondale, May 5.—Mr. and Mrs. John Roach and family attended Memorial services at Floyd's Creek Sunday.
