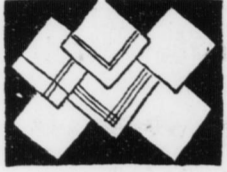


BLACK BEAR TRAIL FEDERAL HIGHWAY

Highway Through County Given Federal Highway Number 221

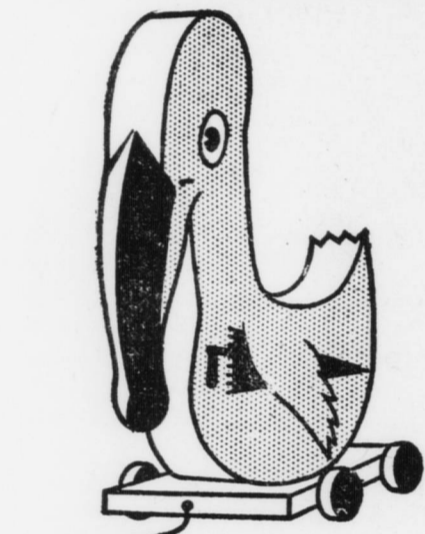
Announcement has been received here that the famous Black Bear Trail, North to South Scenic-Historic Highway which runs from Quebec, Canada to Miami, Fla., has been accepted as Federal Highway No. 221 from Roanoke, Va., to Greenwood, S. C. It enters Rutherford county at the McDowell line above Union Mills and follows Highway 19 to Rutherfordton, then follows Highway 20 to Forest City and State Highway No. 207 from there to the South

This trail receiving a Federal number will mean increased tourist travel and will soon mean that much of the travel from Canada and the New England States to Florida and points South of here will come over this route.

On the Black Bear Trail there are at least seven important points of origination or approaches for tourists travel: The Canada territory between Quebec and Montreal; The New York territory between Rouses Point and Kingston; The Pennsylvania and Maryland territory which includes Bethlehem, York, Gettysburg, Frederick and Harpers Ferry; The Shenandoah Valley territory from Winchester through Staunton, Lexington and Roanoke, passing the proposed Shenandoah National Park; Western North Carolina; Piedmont South Carolina, terminating at Augusta, Ga., with which is an important gateway for tourist travel. Southern Georgia and Central and Southern Florida, from Waycross through Jacksonville, Green Cove Springs, DeLand, Sanford, and Haines City on to Sarasoto or Miami.

"THE ROCK OF DECISION" BY BERTHA B. MOORE

"The Rock of Decision," by Bertha B. Moore, formerly of South Mountain Institute, published this year by Wm. B. Erdman's Publishing Company, is a book in which the "mountaineer" and his home life is portrayed with rare intuition and sympathy. It is full of the color and beauty of the mountains and only a person who has lived and worked among these stalwart people could depict in such a realistic way the joys and sorrows as they occur in the every day life of these mountain folk.

The scene is laid in and around South Mountain Institute and the characters are men, women and children with whom the author is intimately acquainted. There, we have the secret of the very personal appeal of the story.

Miss Moore has dedicated her book "To You Who Have Introduced Phoebe To Me." Phoebe, of course, is the heroine, a 14-year-old girl, the oldest, but one, of 12 children. As we follow the story of this beautiful girl's life—old beyond her years, burdened for her poor overworked mother and shouldering the responsibility of her younger brothers and sisters, bullied by a drunken father, we do not wonder that she was uncertain of God's existence and His power to help her.

It is interesting to see the influence of the school and its Christian workers as they came to touch the lives of this family and finally of the surrounding community. After many hardships Phoebe graduated from the school and became one of the bright lights of the settlement, finding her places there as a teacher of Domestic Science. She was able to lift the burden of her family and to see her father converted. She herself was led to see the light and pledged her troth to a young student whose ambition was to finish the seminary and come back to the mountains to preach. The rock of decision was the scene of many of Phoebe's joys and sorrows and it is here we leave her at the close of the book.

New Postoffice At Rutherfordton

Rutherfordton, July 6.—The U. S. Treasury Department, Saturday notified Postmaster John H. Williams here to have the postoffice lot vacated and cleared within 60 days from that date. This means that the Department is getting ready to let the contract for the new \$75,000 Federal building here. Postmaster Williams says the plans for the new building are likely to arrive any day. He has already notified the U. S. Treasury Department that the building lot is vacated and ready for building. The soil survey has been made and other preliminaries carried out.

Mr. Robt. E. Bauch, United States Postoffice Inspector was here recently to arrange details for the new building. He stated that the appropriation had already been made for the building and the plans were being drawn. He also stated that such contracts were usually let to local men, as much as possible and local help was used. He was of the opinion that the \$70,000 or more which had been appropriated for the new structure here would erect a handsome building that would be a credit to Rutherfordton and the county.

PASTORS' CIRCULATING LIBRARY ORGANIZED

A Pastor's Circulating Library Association was organized at Union Mills last week with the following officers: Rev. C. C. Matheny, Forest City, president; Rev. E. B. Jenkins, Rutherfordton, vice president; Dr. J. A. Hunnicutt, Cliffside, secretary-treasurer. The library is for the use of the Sandy Run, Green River and Blue Ridge Baptist Associations. Other associations will be asked to join. Publicity Committee, Revs. J. A. Brock, Caroleen; C. B. Trammel, Columbus and E. J. England, Old Fort.

The purpose of the association is to provide books on religion, history, literature and science. The books will go into the library at Alexander Schools, Inc., of Union Mills for the use of the school pastors and church workers. No charge will be made for the books. Those borrowing them will be asked to pay the postage on them both ways. All books on the above subjects donated will be much appreciated. They should be sent direct to Prof. W. E. Sweatt, Union Mills, or to some officer or member of the committee. The officers will examine every book and be sure that they are the right kind to go into the library. Students of Alexander schools can have access to the books. The idea being to have good books within the reach of the ministers of the above associations, church workers and students.

If you have some good books on any of the above or similar subjects send them in soon. There are about 500 volumes in the library now and it is hoped to have 1500.
