### Woman's Club Asks Hog Pens Be Abolished

At the last meeting of the Forest City Woman's Club resolutions protesting the keeping of hogs in the residential section of the city were adopted. The club also requested the city officials to adopt an ordinance prohibiting the maintenance of hog pens and hogs within the thickly settled sections of the town. The resolutions follow:

"Whereas, in the absence of any law or ordinance preventing the keeping of hogs and hog pens within the residential sections of the town of Forest City, N. C., a great many hogs and hog pens have been and are being kept therein, stagnating the air with a foul odor, providing breeding places for flies and germ carrying insects, and otherwise resulting in most undesirable nuisances; it is therefore,

"Resolved, First: That the Woman's Club of Forest City, North Carolina, unanimously favors the removal and elimination of all hog pens within dense residential sections of the town of Forest City.

"Second: That the Woman's Club of Forest City, North Carolina, earnestly petitions the governing body of said town to pass, at least prior to the opening of the spring of 1932, an ordinance prohibiting the keeping of any hogs within the dense residential sections of said town.

"Third: That a copy of this resolution be placed with the governing body of the town of Forest City, and a copy published in The Forest City Courier.
