We do not know how the nomination of Judge Parker is viewed by the country at large, but it seems to us long before the election a majority of the American people will decide he is a much safer man than the strenuous Roosevelt.

Events of the past week have confirmed us in our opinion that William Jennings Bryan is the greatest living American, and ranks with Washington, Jefferson and Jackson. We do not approve of all he says and does—at times he appears to be dictatorial and to assume the role of a boss—but in point of ability we do not believe he has his equal among American public men.

THE NATIONAL CONVENTION.

After being in session nearly a week the National Democratic Convention nominated Judge A. B. Parker of New York for President and Ex Senator H. G. Davis of West Virginia for Vice President.

The platform adopted ignores the money question and the income tax, two questions of great public interest, but as a whole is perhaps satisfactory to the rank and file of the party.

Of the candidate for President but little is known; less is known of his views of public questions than of any other name mentioned for the nomination but he is expected to stand on the platform and in his letter of acceptance, which will be given out in a few weeks, his views will be outlined.

Judge Parker is not an ideal candidate but we regard him as a much safer man than Roosevelt.

Prof. Stancell.

Prof. Wm Stancell has accepted a position of prominence in the faculty of the Southern Normal University at Huntingdon, having been given the chair of Greek and Science. The faculty of this school consists of 25 teachers and officers.

Military training is given the pupils by U. S. Detailed officer. All in all the school is second to none in the south and it is no small compliment to be a member of its faculty.

That the selection of Prof. Stancell was a good one is unquestioned by all who know him and his record as a scholar and a teacher. He was educated at Wake Forest College and Peabody Normal and has taught in some of the best schools of the south. He is a gentleman of the highest type of moral character and his mental ability is equal to the emergency.—The Guardian-Tribune, Wartrace, Tenn.

CAREER OF HENRY G. DAVIS.

Democratic Nominee for Vice President of the United States. Henry Gassaway Davis, the democratic nominee for vice president, was born in Baltimore, Md., November 16, 1823, and will therefore be eighty-one years old next November. He is a son of Caleb and Louisa (Brown) Davis. His father dying when he was a boy, he entered the employ of ex-Governor Howard, whose fine plantation, called "Waverly," he superintended. After the completion of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, he secured a position as brakeman; was advanced to conductor, and in time, appointed agent at Piedmont. Resigning from the Baltimore & Ohio, he went into business with his brother at Piedmont, under the firm name of H. G. Davis & Co., dealing in general merchandise, coal and lumber.

Mr. Davis realized thoroughly the possibilities of West Virginia and invested in coal lands there which were entirely inaccessible, and consequently of small market value. It was his conception to build the West Virginia, Central and Pittsburg railroad, running from Cumberland along the banks of the Potomac, to its source on the summit of the mountains, and continuing beyond into the valleys of the western slope of the Alleghanies. By giving access to coal and timber lands of the greatest intrinsic value, he sprang at once into an important position in West Virginia affairs.

Mr. Davis is president of the road and also of the Piedmont and Cumberland railway and of the Davis National Bank of Piedmont, founded by him and is a large shareholder in the Davis Coal and Coke Company, and other corporations engaged in the development of the country adjacent to his line of railroads. In the management of some of these enterprises his son in law, Stephen B. Elkins, senator from West Virginia, co-operates with him.

Davis, Tucker county, West Virginia, was founded by him in 1884, and is now a progressive community of 5,000. In 1890 the West Virginia Central and Pittsburg railway was extended into Randolph county, West Virginia, and the town of Elkin was laid out by him. There he has built one of the finest residences in the State.

Mr. Davis is a loyal democrat, and his public service began in 1865, when he was elected a member of the house of delegates of West Virginia. He served with distinction in the state senate during 1867 and 1869 and was United States Senator from 1871 to 1883. Though his constituents were eager for him to continue in the exalted office he declined re-election. He was a delegate to the Pan-American congress, taking an interested part in the proceedings of that body. In 1890 he became a member of the international railway commission. In 1853 he was married to Kate A. Bantz, daughter of Gideon Bantz, of Frederick, Md. They have five children—Hallie D., wife of Hon. Stephen B. Elkins, senator from West Virginia; Kate B., wife of Commodore R. M. G. Brown, United States Navy; Grace T., Henry G., Jr., and John T. Davis.

Mr. Davis has been a delegate from his adopted state to six national democratic conventions. His home address is Elkins, W. Va., and his Washington address, 1517 H. street.
