CAREER OF HENRY G. DAVIS.

Democratic Nominee for Vice President of the United States. Henry Gassaway Davis, the democratic nominee for vice pres ident, was born in Baltimore, \$17,115.00 Md., November 16, 1823, and will therefore be eighty-one years old next November. He is a son of Caleb and Louisa (Brown) Davis. His father dying when he 8,453.44 was a boy, he entered the employ \$39,833.60 of ex-Governor Howard, whose fine plantation, called "Waverly" he superintended. After the com \$ 5,000.00 pletion of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, he secured a position as brakeman; was advanced to 34,305.06 conductor, and in time, appoint ed agent at Piedmond. Resign ing from the Baltimore & Ohio, he went into business with his brother at Piedmont, under the

ates with him. Davis, Tucker county, West Virginia, was founded by him in 1884, and is now a progressive community of 5,000. In 1890 ths West Virginia Central and Pittsburg railway was extended into Randolph county, West Virginia, and the town of Elkin was laid out by him. There he has built one of the finest residences

Mr. Davis is a loyal democrat, and his public service began in 1865, when he was elected a member of the house of delegates of of West Virginia. He served Rich Square, N. C. with distinction in the state senate during 1867 and 1869 and STOVES! was United States Senator from 1871 to 1883. Though his constituents were eager for him to continue in the exaulted office he declined re election. He was a delegate to the Pan-American congress, taking an interested part in the proceedings of that body. In 1890 he became a member of the international railway commission. In 1853 he was marsied to Kate A. Bantz, daughter of Gideon Bantz, of Frederick, Md., They have five children—Hallie D.. wife of Hon. Stephen B Elkins, senator from West Virginia; Kate B., wife of Commodore R. M. G. Brown,
