Copper is somewhat the better in durability. Both kinds of conductor when cor rectly installed give satisfactory protection.

> Copper conductors should weigh not less than 3 ounces per foot; 27.00 iron not less than 320 pounds per thousand feet, or a little over 5 9.00 ounces per foot, says the Weath er Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Lightning conductors should be attached direct to the surface of a building without insulators. The air terminals to protect up ward-pointing parts of the roof should be secured against overturning by the wind, and the ground connections extended downward to permanently moist at Potecasi, in the State of North Carsoil, usually found at a depth of 8 or 10 feet below the surface. All joints should be permanently made and of low electrical resistance.
