## "DYNAMITE --- CONCENTRATED POWER"

The business of blasting of stumps, breaking up large bould ers, blowing out drainlands un- ating Effect. 60c. der the plow through the medium of explosives is pictured in a new United States Department of Agriculture educational film. "Dynamite-Concentrated Pow-

The film is a contribution from the Bureau of Public Roads. It is designed to show farmers safe methods of using dynamite, and contains many details of blast ing operations. The acts of punching holes, loading, priming and exploding the charge have been transferred to the screen through the medium of the close up. Both the safety-fuse and electric methods of blasting are included.

The use of explosives on farms is said to be rapidly increasing. It is estimated that about 20,-000,000 pounds of explosives are used annually for agricultural purposes. The film aims to encourage farmers to avail themselves of the tremendous power concentrated in dynamite and to insure proper handling of the ex plosives. Scenes showing the actual blasting of stumps, bould ers, and ditches make a spectacular picture. The blasting of a ditch 400 feet long and 6 feet deep in a single shot, and slowmotion pictures of the blasting of a huge Douglas fir stump, are features of the film.

"Dynamite · Concentrated Power" was photographed in Vir ginia, North Carolina, Michigan and Washington. The film was adapted for general use throughout the United States. It is one reel in length. Copies may be
