NEWS OF A WEEK.

The Democratic majority in Virginia at the last election is less than 520 votes.

Jahann Most convicted on the charge of making an inflammatory speech on November 11th.—The vote in the prohibition election in Atlanta, was canvassed yesterday and it was found that the majority against prohibition was 1,128.

The sale of liquor will begin at once.—Corps commanders of the French army have received sealed orders to be opened in the event of an outbreak on the election of a new President of France, which it is expected will take place to-day.

It now seems probable that M. Grevy will not resign the presidency of the French Republic notwithstanding his late utterances.—Jacob Sharp was yesterday taken from Ludlow street jail, New York and carried before one of the city courts. He was admitted to bail in the of \$9,000.—Dec 27. The Richmond, Atlanta, Galena and Dolphin, of the North Atlantic squadron, arrived at New York yesterday.—At last M. Grevy has succumbed to the pressure brought to bear against him, and has resigned the presidency of the French Republic.

Snyder, the Indiana ped-staler, who couldn't stop walking did of exhaustion.—The President yesterday (combined) Hon. L. Q. C. Lamar, of Miss, as an Associate Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.—The President's message is with only one subject, but he exhausts it, and presents his views on the tariff question in a forcible manner.—Hon. W. F. Vilas, of Wis., has been nominated to be Secretary of the Interior, and Hon. Don M. Dickinson, of Mich., to be Postmaster General.—The Supreme Court decides that a State has a right to tax out of existence or confiscate a business if it is deemed to be productive of poverty and that no compensation can be claimed thus upholding the prohibitory laws of Kansas.—The London Times' commenting on the election of M. Carnot to the Presidency of France says: "For the present the Republicans are united and able to show a firm front against monarchist intrigues and anarchist outbreaks. M. Carnot holds his position at the mercy of a parliamentary vote.

Dec. 28th. The Senate held a short session yesterday, but transacted no business of importance.—The President of France has requested M. Falder to form a cabinet of the new government.—Gov. Lee thinks the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court practically settles the Virginia debt, for the creditors now accept what the State has the ability to pay.—In his message to the Legislature of Virginia, Gov. Lee made some important suggestions in regard to the State debt, which has been a source of much annoyance to the people of that Commonwealth.

Senator Vance, Senator Gorman, of Maryland, Gov. Hill of N. Y., and other prominent gentlemen will be dined by the Harlem N. Y. Democratic club, on the 29th inst.

Prof. G. H. Water, will give exhibitions daily on his celebrated swimming apparatus. He will be the great attraction at the Carteret County Oyster, Fish, Game and Produce Association to be held in the town of Beaufort on December 14th, 15th and 16th. He is often called the "Man Fish." His exhibition will be given in public. He will swim to and fro in the Sound, in front of the town, where he will be seen by everybody. He swims very capably. He has given exhibitions at Cokey Island, Long Branch, and other watering places. Prof. Water is the wonder of the world, he has the endorsements of Capt. S. I. Kimball, Supt. of the Life Saving Service. He has journeyed from Cape Henry to this place, showing by actual demonstration what his machine is worth. He goes through the breakers with ease. He has letters from various keepers of Life Saving Stations along the coast, which recommend his machine. His apparatus is far superior to that worn and patented by Capt. Paul Byron.

The apparatus consists of two air cylinders, cigar shaped. He reclines on a netting which is fastened to the cylinders. His head is supported, and his hands and feet are his motive power. He moves rapidly through the water, and is often taken for a porpoise or other large fish. He has been frequently shot at while in the water. The Prof. will have his entire apparatus for exhibition in the main hall at the Fair. He will also exhibit his "Land Boat or Flying Machine." This is a wonderful invention and will attract hundreds of people. He can travel on the beach with his machine at a high rate of speed. His remarkable feat—remaining for hours in the water are wonderful. At Atlantic City, N. J. on July 23rd, last, he traveled a life boat two miles out to sea and back in one hour. The boat contained twelve full grown men. He was buckled on his feet, two large curious shaped shoes. The apparatus consists of two air cylinders, cigar shaped. 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
