## Cotton Farmers and Business Men's Association.

A meeting of the Cotton Farmers and Business Men's Association met according to adjournment at the Court House in Bayboro January 29th 1905. The meeting was called to order by W. H. Sawyer, Vice President in the absence of C. A. Flowers, President. Reports from Township associations was called for.

Township No. 1 Reported by A. J. Holton, Jr., progress. Most all cotton farmers were signing up and reducing acreage in cotton and commercial fertilizers—according to resolutions of State and county Association. Township No. 2 Reported by T. J. Sawyer, farmers most all met at Township meeting and signed resolutions.

Township No. 3. Reported, progress. Farmers were signing up resolutions pretty well.

A summary of reports showed that about 200 cotton farmers had signed up resolutions to reduce acreage, about 30 per cent. from last year and reduction of fertilizers about the same.

I. W. Miller moved that the association hold monthly Township and County meetings. This motion was amended as follows. That a Township meeting be held in each Township on the first Saturday in February at 2 o'clock p. m. and the County Association meet the second Saturday in February at the Court House in Bayboro at 11 o'clock a. m. Motion as amended was adopted.

On motion every member of this association was appointed a committee to

see the people and report to the next County meeting. On motion of I. W. Miller a committee of three were appointed by the Chairman to draft resolutions to be reported to the next county meeting. I. W. Miller, A. J. Holton, Jr. and L. W. Brooks were appointed a committee. On motion, it was

Resolved, That a good Road Meeting be held at the Court House in Bayboro on the second Saturday in February immediately after the adjournment of the meeting of this County Association to ask the Legislature to pass a suitable road law for this county. Everybody are invited to attend this meeting. The Bayboro Sentinel was requested to publish these proceedings. The meeting then adjourned to meet the second Saturday in February.

We are not inclined to stand by the Howland Improvement Company's Lease of the A. & N. C. R. R. if they be doing anything purposely to the detriment of this Section of the State. Nor can we see how they can afford to do such. It seems to us that if the lessee company expects much from this property they must run it upon such plain practical business principles as will tend to build up this whole section of the country—Not a few but the many business and industries in this section. So long as they run it upon purely business principles. We can see no cause to complain—every successful business man has to do the same in his business and we ought not to complain of others for doing that which we do ourselves. There is a little piece of Scripture that might fit in just here, but as we are not talking scripture but business we will not quote it. Our opinion is that we ought not to complain and kick too hurriedly, watch and wait, give time for results. As a citizen of Pamlico county, we favor the lease and so does nearly every other citizen of the county. We think the Legislature ought to confirm it.

## Baby Born With Tail
