**Concerning Roads**

It is very necessary to the de-  
velopment of Carteret county  
that it should have a system of  
roads that will connect up the  
entire county. Only in this way  
can the business of the people be  
properly carried on and continue  
to grow.

We are fortunate here in hav-  
ing water transportation and  
this method of conveyance which  
has been so useful in the past  
will always be a great advantage  
to this part of the country. Wa-  
ter transportation though, while  
the best there is for heavy freight  
is too slow for other purposes.  
This is the age of the quick mov-  
ing passenger automobile and  
truck. Automobiles require  
good roads and as we must have  
the roads if we would make use  
of these swiftly moving vehicles.

When once we get a system of  
good roads in this county we will  
have a great advantage over the  
upper portions of the State.  
They can have only railroads  
and highways while we have  
these and water routes besides.  
A proper development of all  
these agencies of travel will quick-  
en up Carteret in the very front  
rank of all the counties of the  
State.

It is foolish to spend our time  
and energy squabbling about  
building a road to this or that

point. Nothing less than a net-  
work of roads that will cover the  
entire county will meet our needs  
and no other plan than this should  
be seriously considered.
