BIG COWS GIVE MOST MILK

Analysis of Records of Testing Assotions Show Large Animals Are

Cow-testing records based on 38,-582 dairy cows from 110 cow-testing associations are being analyzed by specialists of the dairy division, United States department of agriculture. The tabulations have brought out a number of interesting relations between milk production, butterfat test, butter fat production, and income over cost of feed. The larger cows excelled the medium and small cows in production of both milk and butter

The average annual milk production of all the animals was 5,936 pounds per cow, and the average butterfat production 246 pounds. These figures are considerably larger than the average
